Dear Sir / Madam,

Please accept this e-mail as my objection to the proposed electoral boundary change for Rainbow Beach.

I have been actively involved in the Rainbow Beach community for the last 39 years as an active member of the local lifesaving club.

Over this time, I have seen Rainbow Beach grow from the small sand mining town, in the late 1970's to the thriving community it is today.

It should be noted that the Gympie Regional Council (GRC) has supported all local Rainbow Beach community groups and assisted them during this period, not the Noosa Shire Council. All emergency services that serve Rainbow Beach are located in either Rainbow Beach, Tin can Bay & the nearest hospital is in Gympie.

The Rainbow Beach community needs to rely on GRC for these services as there is no direct road link to Noosa, other than Teewah Beach.

The amount of voting residents in Rainbow Beach will have little impact on a Noosa election as there is approximately only 1,100 residents in total, living at Rainbow Beach.

This equates to approximately 2.8 % of the Noosa Shire which has an approximate population of 39,400.

The real concern is eco-tourism where private enterprise endeavours to make areas exclusive to the general public.

One must wonder if there is more to the proposed boundary change than just perceived benefit in the voting demographic for the Noosa Shire.



Noosa's community of interest clearly includes the areas in Weyba Downs and Peregian Beach (West), while it clearly does NOT include the Rainbow Beach locality. Weyba Downs and Peregian Beach West sit on Lake Weyba which is part of the Noosa River System. Lake Weyba and Emu Mountain Road through to the ocean are key physical features in defining the southern boundary of the Noosa electorate. The existing southern boundary of the Noosa electorate more effectively includes the great majority of the existing and future Noosa community. Retaining Weyba Downs and Peregian Beach (West) which has a projected growth of just 4.3% to 2023 will improve demographic outcomes. Noosa is predicted to be 6.24% below electoral quota by 2023. Ninderry predicted to be 3.30% under quota by 2023 could be adjusted with Buderim which is projected to be 4.59% above quota by 2023. Makes sense. Such an adjustment to proposed boundaries would reduce the over quota starting position for Buderim and ensure that community of interest in both Noosa and Mons/Kunda Park areas were maintained within the relevant electorates. The existing LGA boundary is irrelevant to Weyba Downs and Peregian Beach (West) as the centre of Noosa is 5 minutes away, whilst the centre of Sunshine Coast Council is 45 minutes away. There is no community of interest for the Weyba Downs and Peregian Beach (West) with rest of proposed Ninderry electorate.

QUEENSLAND STATE REDISTRIBUTION 2017 – HINCHINBROOK ELECTORATE

Dear Sir or Madam,

I am writing this submission letter to you today to advise that our Chamber is not in support of the proposed electoral boundary changes. There are a number of reasons that we, as a business, industry and tourism group based in a longtime rural electorate do not support the proposed boundary changes :-

- If these draft boundaries are agreed to, the Hinchinbrook electorate will become primarily an urban electorate based on the northern suburbs of Townsville and the focus of the seat will be on urban issues and the rural issues that we constantly face will be pushed to the side. We seem to have rural electorate issues pushed to the side so much and these changes would only enforce that more.
- In fact, approximately two-thirds of voters in the Hinchinbrook electorate will be located in the Townsville City Council area (south of Crystal Creek to the Bohle River), with just a rural tail (the Hinchinbrook Shire and Cardwell).
- It would be more beneficial for the Herbert River district to be in a state seat that included more rural areas of the Cassowary Coast Region, up to Innisfail, given their common economic and communities of interest.
- The Hinchinbrook Shire has recently put considerable effort into strengthening regional ties with the Cassowary Coast Region through organisations like Tropical Coast Tourism and Cassowary Coast Economic Development.
- These ties represent the similar economic and community interests of the Hinchinbrook Shire and the Cassowary Coast Region, as well as the connection established by the Bruce Highway as their major transport link.

We urge you to re-consider the communities of interest criteria and we urge you to consider the northern boundary of Hinchinbrook to include more communities in the Cassowary Coast Region.

The term "D'Aguilar" has no real connection to the proposed D'Aguilar electorate. Whilst the electorate does include parts of the D'Aguilar National Park, this isn't a significant reference point for locals. Furthermore, when people in our region think of D'Aguilar, they think more of the township of D'Aguilar (which is not in the proposed electorate) or the D'Aguilar Highway (also not in the proposed electorate). The name "Pine Rivers" has a great deal of history and significance for our region. Council amalgamations in 2008 removed the identity of Pine Rivers, although it is carried on by many businesses, schools, community organisations, sporting clubs. It remains a name that many use in regular use in our region. As a former State MP for the electorate of Pine Rivers, I would recommend sticking with the electorate name of Pine Rivers. All of the proposed electorate is within the former Pine Rivers Shire and still carries the Pine Rivers tag to some extent. As for the proposed electorate boundaries, I believe some of these are odd in the way they split suburbs or disconnect suburbs/localities that would ordinarily be connected. However, given I am nominating as a Candidate for this electorate at the next State Election, I feel it would be inappropriate for me to offer suggestions on the location of boundaries. A sitting MP or Candidate trying to advocate for areas to be included/excluded from their electorate could easily be viewed as trying to influence the outcome of future elections by including/excluding areas that traditionally vote a particular way. I appreciate the challenges faced by the Commission in ensuring voter numbers in each electorate are similar, and understand this is never an easy process. I would, however, suggest that you take note of submissions from Pine Rivers/D'Aguilar locals regarding proposed boundary changes to this electorate, particularly those involved in local community organisations. 
As such the proposal is a good example of the scant regard politicians hold for the people they are meant to serve.

Cassowary Coast Regional Council - Submission to Electoral Commission Queensland's Decision on New Electorate - Hill

At the Cassowary Coast Regional Council Local Government Meeting held on 23 March 2017 the following Resolution was adopted:

Resolution No. 0089

"That the Cassowary Coast Regional Council (CCRC) via a formal submission rejects the proposed new electorate boundaries and request that the CCRC be included as a whole within the proposed electorate of Hill."

Reasons

- The redistribution of boundaries should take into consideration the impact on Councils becoming electorally split and where possible, should be avoided.
- In 2008 Cardwell and Johnstone Shires were amalgamated with the intent, amongst other things, of addressing conflicting planning schemes local laws and policies, rating policies and the overlapping of Local Government representation.
- The inclusion of the CCRC as a whole within the proposed new Electorate of Hill could be seen to complement and/or complete the intent of that 2008 boundary change decision.
- Possibly six (6) of seven (7) CCRC Divisional Councillors will have a separate political representative within the State Government, or more concerning, only one (1) Councillor will.

Background:

The proposed new Electorate of Hill would see residents of the Cassowary Coast Regional Council (CCRC) south of Dean Road, Tully through to Cardwell remain within the Electorate of Hinchinbrook, whilst the remainder of CCRC residents would become part of the proposed new Electorate of Hill.

There could be areas of concern with future planning and other consequences that could arise for Council should the recommendation by the ECQ be effected including to, the Elected Member for Division 1 (which includes the areas of Cardwell, Kennedy, Bilyana, Euramo, Hinchinbrook Island, Murray Upper, Lower Tully, Tully Heads and Hulls Heads) becoming isolated in a representative sense.

The amalgamation of Queensland Local Government Councils in 2008 was considered to be a major step forward to aligning Councils within new formalised boundaries, and in the case of Cardwell and Johnstone Shires, to address conflicts such as inconsistencies within planning schemes, local laws and overlapping Local Government representation within boundaries such as with Mission Beach.

RE: Proposed Electoral Boundary Changes

Kawana Scout Group has been firmly established in the Kawana community since 1980 and is located at 58 Iluka Avenue, Buddina, placing it in the area that would be excluded from the Kawana electorate and moved into the Buderim electorate.

Kawana Scout Group is a community organisation solely managed by dedicated volunteers freely giving of their time and efforts to ensure this aim is met through the ongoing delivery of the Scouting program. It is a valuable contributor to the youth of the community, presently consisting of 79 youth members with the goal of providing young Aussies aged 6 to 26 with fun and challenging opportunities to grow through adventure. Scouts is the largest youth movement in the nation and the world. The purpose of the Scout Movement is to encourage the physical, intellectual, emotional, social and spiritual development of young people so that they take a constructive place in society as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. Scouts are tenacious, resilient leaders.

Upon review of the Queensland Redistribution Commission proposed boundary changes to the Queensland electorate of Kawana we would like to express our objection to this proposed change on the following grounds:

Financial Sustainability

As is the case with most volunteer organisations, Kawana Scout Group relies substantially on community support and grant funding to remain financially viable. We fear that without this support, the cost of participating in Scouting would become unsustainable with costs spiralling out of control. Considering the Leaders, families and other supporters of our youth members, this means in excess of 250 community members are adversely impacted by such an event.

It is our concern that moving our organisation into Buderim electorate will precipitate this event making accessibility to funding for our Group difficult and restrictive.



We fear this will manifest itself through reduced funding for our Group due to increased numbers of other community organisations vying for the same amount of funding. Such competition would also include our Group competing for funding against a fellow Scout Group already existing in Buderim.

Community Identity

Scouting is synonymous with any Community name. When one says I belong to Kawana Scout Group, it is immediately identifiable with the Kawana Community, that part of the Sunshine Coast that sits below the southern bank of the Mooloolah River. Kawana Scout Group has been known as such within the Kawana Community for the last 37 years and is an integral part of the fabric that makes the Kawana Community what it is today. Our members choose and are proud to be part of the Kawana community, not Buderim.

It is our fear that moving our organisation into Buderim electorate will impact on this long established and highly reputable identity that we and generations before us have worked so tirelessly establish within the Kawana community.

Cross Border Restrictions

The proposed change to the electoral boundary lances only a small part of the Kawana community from Kawana of which our Group happens to be a part. The remaining portion of the Kawana community remains unchanged, but sharing a border with our organisation. Geographically we will undeniably remain a part of the Kawana community with no direct connection to Buderim but physically separated by a national park and river.

It is our concern under this proposed change that we will now become insignificant in the community that supports us and fear we will be isolated from Kawana community planning activities merely because we are not identified as being in Kawana.

It is also our concern that our participation in Kawana community activities of which we are a part will be hindered and restricted by the bureaucracy of cross border involvement and coordination.

Electoral Member Relationship

In almost four decades of existence in the Kawana community, Kawana Scout Group has enjoyed and always maintained a healthy rapport and communication with the elected member for Kawana, regardless of political view. This has allowed each elected member an intimate insight into our Group's operations and the benefits the Kawana community reap as a result of our continued existence.

It is our concern that the proposed reallocation to Buderim will introduce restrictive physical and bureaucratic barriers to maintaining this relationship, one which must also be shared with



our fellow Scout Group in Buderim that will lead to a detrimental impact on over 80 families within the Kawana community.

Distribution of Member Contributions

Kawana Scout Group is an organisation solely managed by dedicated volunteers freely giving of their time and efforts which they believe are in support of the Kawana community in which they consciously choose to be a part.

It is our concern that such monumental volunteering efforts and contributions will no longer be directed into the geographical location in which we are located in the Kawana community, but will be recognised as belonging to the Buderim community.

We respectfully submit this objection for your consideration and strongly urge you to reconsider these changes that would effectively isolate the Kawana Scout Group from the geographical community of which it has been an integral part for the past four decades.

We are writing in Objection to the proposed name change of the Pine Rivers state district to the new name of D'Aguilar, as proposed on page 159 of the *The Queensland Redistribution Commission's Proposal* released Friday, 24th February, 2017. The Association considered the proposed electoral district name change at the General Meeting on the 6th March 2017, and it was unanimously decided to object to the proposed name change.

The reasons for our Objection include:

- We disagree with the reasons for the name change as described in the proposal.
- The name *Pine Rivers* still encapsulates the new added suburbs to the electoral district.
- The Pine Rivers Show and Pine Rivers AH & I Association identify with the name Pine Rivers.
- The historical and symbolical references of the Pine Rivers still reflect the electoral area.
- The Pine Rivers name and like, are still used throughout the community.
- The D'Aguilar Township is not with the boundaries of this electoral district; and
- The D'Aguilar National Park is not with the boundaries of this electoral district

Reason for Name Change as documented in the Proposal

In the proposal document, the name change was suggested due to the district now encapsulating additional southern suburbs and rural suburbs. It suggests that with some of the new additions of Mountains in our State District, that the name change seemed appropriate to reflect the changed nature of the district. Note the proposal also mentions two mountains, Camp Mountain and Mount Mee, which although they are a part of the D'Aguilar Range, they are not actually encompassed in the new proposed electoral district of D'Aguilar.

We believe because the electoral district does not cover the whole D'Aguilar Range, nor that the D'Aguilar Range represents the remaining part of the electoral district, that Pine Rivers is still a better name to represent the area.

The name Pine Rivers still Encapsulates the New Added Suburbs

The additional suburbs now added to the new state district, as listed in the proposal document, all have a historical connection with the name "Pine Rivers". The reason being the new suburbs that have been added, plus the existing suburbs of the district, existed together in the former council area of *Shire of Pine Rivers* (formally known as *Shire of Pine*) for over 100 years.

Pine Rivers Show Ground & Association

The Pine Rivers AH & I Association, previously just known as The Pine Rivers Show, has run the local show (still known as "The Pine Rivers Show"), here at the showgrounds at Lawnton for 113 years. During the majority of our history we have existed in the Pine Rivers Shire area, and still maintain our name sake, despite the amalgamation of our Shire into the Moreton Bay Region. We were not happy that we lost the Shire identity with the amalgamation, but felt we still held a connection while the State electorate of Pine Rivers still remained.

An Association such as a Show Society is at the core of a Community, and the 'old-timers', such as my 90yr old mother, always refers to the parts of the community as 'The Pine' – it was often also referred to more specifically as 'North Pine' or 'South Pine'.

The number of members and volunteers who support this Association consists of over 500, drawn from all over the locality that was previously Pine Rivers Shire. They all have a passion for their local 'Pine Rivers Show'. Attached is a scan of the signatures of some of our members and volunteers, who we were able to secure at short notice, and who object to this State Electoral boundary name change. Although the Showgrounds are not in the existing Pine Rivers Electorate, we nonetheless very strongly identify as Pine Rivers.

The Historical reference of the name Pine Rivers

The name of the Shire of Pine Rivers came from the main rivers in the Shire area consisting of the *North Pine River* and *South Pine River* which join to become the *Pine River*. Both the *North Pine* and *South Pine Rivers* originate in the D'Aguilar Range and flow east. The *North Pine Dam* sits along the centre of the *North Pine River*, and on the North Eastern part of our Electorate border.

The geographical path of the Rivers, which begin in two different mountain parts of the D'Aguilar Range, pass through our rural sections, then through our suburban sections to join together, and is still a rather fitting symbol of our State Electorate. It is especially poignant to us that the North and South Pine rivers flow to the north and south of the Showgrounds, joining up not far us at Lawnton Pocket.

Pine Rivers Name Usage Heavily Used

The names *Pine Rivers*, *North Pine* and *South Pine* has been adopted by many local Churches, Clubs, RSLs, Sporting Organisations, Schools, local businesses even hospitals.

The D'Aguilar Township not actually within our Electorate District

The D'Aguilar Township not existing within our Electorate District, will not only cause confusion for our local voters who know it's distance north from us, but it is also likely to confuse the D'Aguilar Town locals when they are trying to identify their local State District area.

The D'Aguilar National Park not actually within our Electorate District

The D'Aguilar National Park, at Mt Mee also sits outside our electoral boundary, and would be confusing that the State Representative of D'Aguilar doesn't represent this State run National Park.

With these points listed, we hope you consider keeping the more local, symbolic and more representative name of "Pine Rivers" for our local state electoral area.

Australia has a young English-speaking history and it seems a shame to be robbing this district of a name that has been synonymous with this area since its' early settlement.

TOWNSVILLE ENTERPRISE SUBMISSION: Proposal for the Redistribution of the State's Electoral Districts

Townsville Enterprise has reviewed the Proposal for the Redistribution of the State's Electoral Districts and is posing the following objections:

PALM ISLAND TO REMAIN WITHIN THE SEAT OF TOWNSVILLE

Greater Palm Island is home to over 40 Indigenous communities comprised of more than 5,000 people, situated 65 kilometres north-west off the coast from Townsville. Palm Island's isolation is one of the biggest challenges it faces in achieving economic growth within the community. The Palm Island community has:

- High unemployment of 57.3% (March 2017) especially in the younger than average population on Palm (49% under the age of 24 years cf. the region average of 36.4%).
- Limited job opportunities due to having a small business base but with real potential to expand based on recent nurturing of tourism development opportunities, encouragement of local entrepreneurship, and various housing and commercial developments in the pipeline.

These disadvantages are real and are affecting the opportunities of all generations in their ability to improve life in their community. To date, being represented by the Seat of Townsville is strategic politically and commercially for the following reasons:

- The economic development corridor is between Palm Island and Townsville, not Palm Island and Hinchinbrook. The two areas have had a strong positive association in terms of business and transport corridors and there are a number of economic development strategies that are progressing and furthering these opportunities. Considering the unemployment and limited job opportunities that currently exist, and the progress politically and commercially that has been made, changing these boundaries at this critical time would be disruptive and unproductive.
- The people of Palm Island resonate with the electorate of Townsville. Residents are visiting Townsville regularly to shop, visit family, attend medical appointments and progress business.
- A number of Townsville community and professional services support Palm Island and being represented in the same electorate ensures that the social and commercial issues are consistently identified and addressed.

THE SEAT OF DALRYMPLE TO REMAIN OR AT MINIMUM CHARTERS TOWERS BE REPRESENTED BY THE MCMASTER/BURDEKIN SEAT

Charters Towers Regional Council is located 126km from the coastal centre of Townsville in North Queensland (NQ) and has a population of 12,433, of which 7,564 are electors. The region was included in the former electorate of Dalrymple.

In the redistribution, the Local Government Area has been included in Traeger (formerly Mount Isa). While Townsville Enterprise agrees that having the whole of the Local Government Area included in any new redistribution area is positive, Townsville Enterprise is of the view that the preference is for the Seat of Dalrymple to remain to ensure that that a strong voice based in Charters Towers is possible. Losing a representative from North Queensland (defined as the Townsville/Burdekin/Hinchinbrook/Charters Towers/Palm Island region) is not positive.

At minimum, if the Seat of Dalrymple is to no longer exist, then the Charters Towers Regional Council area should be included in McMaster not Traeger for the following reasons:

- The electorate will be too large to be effectively served by a single elected member. It would be very difficult for one member to effectively represent two major regional cities and at least a dozen regional towns which stretch over almost 1,000km.
- The two major urban centres of Mount Isa and Charters Towers are effectively on the opposite sides of the State and therefore face very different economic, social and political issues.
- The people of North and North West Queensland will have a reduction in representation.
- North Queensland is under represented in Brisbane despite the North Queensland region contributing over \$13B in GRP.
- The North Queensland region is on the cusp of substantial economic growth and needs an informed local member who can focus on the needs and not have issues lost due to the competing demands of at least six other Council areas.
- The most appropriate community of interest to form any new electorate would be better based on the Burdekin River Basin which would give much of the electorate a common interest.

THE SEAT OF HINCHINBROOK

The current boundaries of the Hinchinbrook Electorate encompass rural coastal communities situated between the major regional centres of Cairns and Townsville with economies that are heavily reliant on primary industries and related manufacturing.

The current external boundaries reflect the common interests of the Seat with the main focus being agriculture based and the need to protect, enhance and support livelihood and life based upon agriculture.

If the recommendations are accepted, the Hinchinbrook Electorate demographic will shift from a predominately agriculture based Seat to an urban based Seat, given that the majority of the

population of Hinchinbrook will then reside in the northern most suburbs of Townsville City, south of Crystal Creek, where minimal agriculture occurs.

Because of the overwhelming majority of population, the focus of the Hinchinbrook Electorate will convert to urban based issues to the detriment of the Seat's current rural lifestyle and dependency.

It is estimated that two-thirds of the electorate will actually reside in the Townsville City Council area. Under the terms of the Local Government Reform Commission, it was not considered appropriate for the local authority of Hinchinbrook to be amalgamated with Townsville City as little or no community interest existed. This situation has not changed and this argument cannot be discounted at a State Electorate level.

THE BURDEKIN SEAT NOT BE RENAMED MCMASTER

Townsville Enterprise is opposed to the proposed electorate name change to "McMaster". The Burdekin is a recognised name and is a name that represents so much of the proposed new electorate due to the strong historic and economic ties to the Burdekin River Catchment and the name is one which constituents can easily identify with. The public feedback the Burdekin Shire Council has received on this issue has been very clear in opposition to the proposed name and we request that the Commission duly consider retaining the name of Burdekin for this electorate. The communities within the proposed electorate also do not have sufficient economic or social interest to justify being grouped together.

The proposed electorate of McMaster would present considerable challenges to the elected member responsible for advocating the needs of such a large and diverse area. Although there are good transport connections within the proposed electorate, there is little other alignment that would justify the proposed grouping.

I would like to object to the proposed name for the new electorate of 'Cooper' and propose an alternative name/s.

While it is commendable to suggest that the new electorate be named after Dr. Lilian Cooper who arrived in Brisbane in 1891 and became the first female doctor of medicine in Queensland in the same year, there are - and where then - already other names that have existing historical meaning and resonance for the residents of the area.

Both 'Enoggera' and 'Ithaca' carry with them a sense of identity and familiarity for the residents of the proposed electorate, whereas 'Cooper' does not - Dr. Lilian Cooper having no particular or sustained association with the area (as far as I am aware).

ENOGGERA is generally agreed to be a word of Aboriginal origin, with various possible meanings and it is likely that it has been used in the area since the 1840's - the Parish of Enoggera through which the Enoggera Creek runs being named in the 1850's! [Beryl Roberts, "Naming Brisbane", 2013, p. 37]

ITHACA is a locality within the area and is said to be named after the birthplace of the wife of the first governor of Queensland. Ithaca was named in 1860 and formed part of the old local government Divisional Board of Enoggera, later divided into smaller shires including Ithaca (later a town).

The name 'Ithaca' is still in use today: Ithaca Town Council Chambers - Enoggera Tce - now used as a Library and Kindergarten Ithaca Fire Station - Enoggera Tce
Ithaca Swimming Pool - Caxton St
Ithaca Creek State School
Ithaca Red Hill Parish (Anglican Church) and
Ithaca War Memorial - Enoggera Tce - the centre of Anzac Day ceremonies each year!

It is therefore proposed that the new electorate be called ITHACA.
Failing that ENOGGERA.

I object to the changes to the Gympie electorate in which Rainbow Beach (RB) become separated from its cultural, social and physically near neighbours to become part of the Noosa electorate. The reasons are as follows: 1. There is no road currently directly connecting Noosa to the RB township. The only direct access to the electoral office would be along the beach or 4WD tracks. This makes access to the electoral office difficult for many. Rainbow Beach is isolated from Noosa by several thousand acres of National Park. RB has been always connected by road to Gympie as its service hub since roads existed here. Services in Gympie used by RB residents include council, government offices at all levels, hospital, shopping, entertainment and much more. Noosa is 1 hour 45 minutes away and requires travelling through the Gympie electorate. Public transport is 2 hours 40 minutes away each way. Although marked on maps, the Coastal Link Road is not a sealed road. 2. Noosa and Rainbow Beach are not connected culturally, politically or historically in the same way as the connection between the 3 tightly knit Cooloola Coast villages of Tin Can Bay, Rainbow Beach and Cooloola Cove. Gympie Regional Council is the local government hub for all 3, not Noosa. Many community groups service all 3 communities. 3. The water boundaries make no sense when the water in front of Tin Can Bay belongs to a different electorate than the top of the boat ramp. This puts the management of the foreshore and waterways in 2 different electorates and creates unnecessary complications for development, communication, management and use. 4. RB booth has 564 votes in 2015 which is similar to Tiaro which is historically closely aligned with Maryborough. Giving Tiaro back to Maryborough and letting RB stay in Gympie shifts a similar number of votes. 5. Communities directly west of Noosa and inland from the Noosa coast are more likely to be aligned with Noosa than Rainbow Beach and the balance of votes needed could perhaps be found there. I propose that Rainbow Beach should be maintained as part of the Gympie electorate as should the waterways of the Tin Can Inlet.

The Liberal National Party (LNP) Queensland responds to the Queensland Redistribution Commission's (the Commission) *Proposal for the Redistribution of the State's Electoral Districts* required under the *Electoral Act 1992* (the Act).

Objections to proposed district boundaries

We have examined the proposed 93 districts and, on balance, the general view is that in most instances the QRC's recommendations reflect communities of interest and meet the principles set out in the Act.

There is considerable disquiet with some of the QRC's proposed boundaries which sever communities of interest to the disadvantage of electors. These have caused dismay and angst due to the resulting negative impacts.

As detailed in Attachment A we suggest pragmatic boundary changes to address communities' concerns and create improved cohesion for electors while meeting the strict numerical quotas proscribed in the Act. It also details the proposed boundaries that are unable to be resolved pragmatically due to the need to adhere to the strict numerical requirements of the Act without substantial changes to the proposed QRC boundaries.

The four proposed new electorates placed in the south-east overlooks the decentralised characteristics of the State of Queensland. It is our considered view that one new district could have been and should have been located in regional Queensland, west of the Great Dividing Range.

It is our assessment that the QRC did not take advantage of existing and proposed enrolments in regional Queensland to resolve considerable community dislocation and to prevent the erosion of electors reasonable access to democratic representation.

Please see Attachment A for objection details by district and region.

Objections to proposed district names

There has been substantial public discussion and debate in communities and the electronic and print media opposing the QRC's proposed names for new and existing electoral districts. The Liberal National Party concurs with these community views.

The sentiment expressed by the community aligns with the principle that, where the naming of electoral districts does not necessarily strengthen community bonds, anything done to lessen that

sense of community should be rejected. Accordingly, the naming of a district after a person with limited or no connection to the immediate area does not reflect the view of electors.

ATTACHMENT B

OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

A significant redistribution of electoral boundaries provides an opportunity to review and reaffirm or change the names of electoral districts.

Unfortunately, the *Electoral Act 1992* (the Act) does not provide any guidance as to the naming of districts. For this reason, judgment and personal preference seem to be the only criteria upon which decisions are made.

This contrasts with the situation in relation to the redistribution of federal electoral boundaries where the naming of divisions is governed by a series of non-binding guidelines (see <http://www.aec.gov.au/Electorates/Redistributions/guidelines.htm>) which draw on the principles and practices that have been followed over many redistributions.

While the Liberal National Party recognises that the federal practice has been centred on the naming of divisions after significant figures in contrast with the general approach in Queensland of relying on geographic or locality names, there is some merit in drawing on the federal guidelines in the Queensland context.

It is acknowledged that the use of the names of significant figures in the federal context is less dependent on any particular connection with the specific area so named. In the Queensland context, however, the limited size of electoral districts (approximately one third of the enrolment of federal divisions) should make it more important that any figure so recognized should have a significant and obvious connection to the district taking his or her name.

This was the principle that appears to have been followed in the case of the electoral district of Nicklin named after the former Premier, Sir Frank Nicklin, who represented the then seats of Murrumba and Landsborough, located on what is now called the Sunshine Coast. Since its creation before the 1986 election Nicklin has been a Sunshine Coast based seat and has a clear connection to the former Premier.

This is the most recent, and rare, instance in Queensland where an electoral district has taken the name of a political personality rather than depending on a geographic or locality name.

The principle followed in this case should not be ignored. While the naming of electoral districts does not necessarily strengthen community bonds, anything done to lessen that sense of community should be rejected. Accordingly, the naming of a district after a person with limited or no connection to the immediate area would be a retrograde step.

The Commission should also hesitate to engage in a wholesale renaming of districts just because the opportunity to do so has arisen.

The Commission's proposal recommends the renaming of 13 existing districts, that is, nearly 15 percent of the existing 89 districts. When the creation of the additional four districts is taken into account, 17 districts – or over 18 percent of the enlarged Assembly of 93 – will bear new names. While it is acknowledged that name changes may be required where a major redrawing of boundaries has occurred, there appears to be little justification for such extensive changes.

The federal guidelines caution against this type of behaviour:

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OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

Names of divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons. (<http://www.aec.gov.au/Electorates/Redistributions/guidelines.htm>)

A number of the Commission's suggestions appear not to be accompanied by sufficiently strong reasons and these will be examined below.

A further important factor to consider is the need for continuity and certainty in the naming of districts. Electors have an expectation that they will not be arbitrarily cast into new districts whether through boundary changes or name changes.

It should be noted that the Act requires the Commission to take into account "the boundaries of existing electoral districts" [s 46(1)(d)] when preparing a proposed electoral redistribution. Clearly, this provision is designed to limit the dislocation of electors, help create a level of certainty around the electoral process and contain changes to those that are absolutely necessary.

Changes to names have the same consequences as changes to boundaries. However, to an extent, these consequences are magnified where an existing district undergoes a name change resulting in all electors finding themselves within a new district rather than the relatively small number who may have been added from surrounding districts. In these instances the arguments in favour of change must outweigh those in favour of retaining the traditional name. If this is not the case a change would not appear warranted.

At the same time, wholesale name changes will impose unnecessary costs across a range of government activities which, while not fatal to the cause of a change, should not be disregarded in considering the worth of any such change.

The Liberal National Party believes the principles outlined above should guide the naming or renaming of electoral districts. In accordance with this, the Party submits the following suggestions as to proposed names:

- Cooper
- D'Aguilar
- Hill
- Jordan
- Macalister
- McConnel
- McMaster
- Miller
- Oodgeroo
- Theodore
- Tibrogargan

A. Proposed Cooper

The Commission has proposed the merger of the electoral districts of Indooroopilly, Mount Coot-tha and Ashgrove into two proposed districts of Cooper and Maiwar.

The locality of Ashgrove is central to the proposed electorate of Cooper. The major transport linkage and thoroughfare for this proposed district is Waterworks Road which is synonymous with Ashgrove.

OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

The existing district of Ashgrove was created in 1960 and named after the pre-existing suburb of Ashgrove. This name remains definitive for the area, as recognised by the Ashgrovian architectural house style.

Ashgrove was named after the 'Grove Estate' subdivided in 1884 for the future suburb. The name 'Ashgrove' is believed to be connected to the ash trees that grew in the area.

Dr Lillian Cooper gave distinguished service to medicine; however, her close geographical links are to Brisbane Central and South Brisbane.

The Liberal National Party recommends this district retain the name Ashgrove.

B. Proposed D'Aguilar

The Commission has recommended the name of the existing district of Pine Rivers be changed to D'Aguilar, referring to the fact that more of the D'Aguilar Range will be included in the new district.

While this may be true, it is equally valid that the D'Aguilar Range extends well beyond this proposed district and the name D'Aguilar is associated with a variety of features extending from Caboolture to the South Burnett area. Significant parts of the D'Aguilar National Park are located in the proposed Tibrogargan to the north, south of the main transport route, the D'Aguilar Highway. The D'Aguilar Range is also located principally in the neighbouring district of Tibrogargan. The name D'Aguilar is in no way unique to the proposed district and the adoption of this name can only cause confusion to electors in this and surrounding districts also associated with the name, D'Aguilar.

It is submitted that the name Pine Rivers be retained. This would not only bring an element of continuity but would also acknowledge the fact that more localities from the Pine Rivers district (currently included in Ferny Grove and Kallangur) are being included in the new district. The name Pine Rivers has a long association with this area and was revived as an electoral district name in 2009 replacing Kurwongbah. Bearing this in mind, there do not appear to be sufficient reasons advanced to allocate a third name to this area in less than ten years.

The Liberal National Party recommends this district retain the name Pine Rivers.

C. Proposed Hill

The proposed electoral district of Hill is created from the existing districts of Dalrymple, Hinchinbrook and Mulgrave.

The Liberal National Party does not believe that Hill is a suitable name for this new district. The biographical details supplied by the Commission suggest a tenuous link at best between Professor Hill and the proposed district. While Professor Hill's nine year association with the Great Barrier Reef Committee is acknowledged, it could not be reasonably argued that the connection to this particular area is any stronger than to any other area along the entire length of the Reef.

As was pointed out above the naming of the new Sunshine Coast district of Nicklin in 1986 owed everything to Sir Fran Nicklin's connection with the area in question. The same cannot be said in this instance and a more appropriate name is required.

It is submitted that the new district be named Palmerston.

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OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

The Palmerston Highway is the major connection across the electorate and embraces the coastal and inland areas into a cohesive community of interest. It is named after the distinguished 1880's pioneer, explorer and prospector of the region. He was instrumental in identifying and surveying the vital transport linkage across the Great Dividing Range.

The Liberal National Party recommends that this district be named Palmerston.

D. Proposed Jordan

The proposed district of Jordan is based on the newly emerging community of Springfield. Since the purchase of land in 1992 the area has developed into a thriving urban centre and now includes state and private schools, the Mater Private Hospital, a campus of the University of Southern Queensland, major rail and road links and key retail outlets.

The area is expected to develop over coming decades with its population expected to rise to 140,000 by 2030 at the same time as making a multi-billion dollar contribution to the Queensland economy.

The name Springfield is synonymous with the development that is occurring in the corridor between the established centres of Brisbane and Ipswich. Based on the development of health, education and information technology, Springfield is now a unique community with its own identity.

The suggestion that the new district be named Jordan is worthy but does nothing to acknowledge the unique status of the growing Springfield community or to enhance the sense of community that is developing.

Mrs Jordan was a member of the Ipswich City Council and MLA for Ipswich West and she is generally regarded as being closely associated with the suburb of Brassall located in the existing district of Ipswich West. However, in neither of these roles did she represent the area covered by the proposed district and it is difficult to see how the adoption of this name would significantly reinforce Springfield's community identity.

In recognition of the continuing development of this area the Liberal National Party recommends that this district be named Springfield.

E. Proposed Macalister

The Commission has recommended the creation of a new district located between Brisbane and the Gold Coast and drawn from the existing districts of Albert, Coomera, Redlands, Springwood and Waterford. It has been recommended that the district be named Macalister after the former Queensland Premier, Arthur Macalister, who served in the Legislative Assembly between 1860 and 1976 in the districts of Ipswich and Eastern Downs.

Despite the fact that Macalister served as Queensland Premier, he has little or no connection with this particular part of the state. Indeed, he is widely recognised for his efforts championing the construction of a railway line from Ipswich to Toowoomba – something that is entirely reasonable for a representative of the Ipswich area.

This lack of connection with the northern Gold Coast area is one reason why the name suggested by the Commission is inappropriate. Again, it is in stark contrast to the naming of Nicklin which is referred to above. It is regrettable that the Commission has failed to provide any supporting evidence as to why this district should be so named.

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OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

At the same time, there is the prospect of some confusion arising with the town of Macalister located some 235 kilometres north west of Brisbane on the main western railway line. The creation of a district with the same name completely removed from this town is illogical.

The proposed district is a composite of a number of existing districts. This lends itself to the adoption of a centrally located name which is widely recognised.

The Liberal National Party recommends the district be named Beenleigh after the major urban area within the district's boundaries and the retail, administrative and commercial hub of the area.

F. Proposed McConnel

The Commission has recommended changing the name of the central city seat of Brisbane Central to McConnel, honouring one of the advocates for a Brisbane children's hospital.

However, it is interesting to note that the changes in boundaries recommended by the Commission actually reinforce the existing character of the seat and support the retention of the name Brisbane Central. Indeed, the Commission has acknowledged that the changes it has recommended further centralise the nature of the district by removing suburbs in the north (Newmarket, Wilston, Windsor and Albion) and incorporating inner suburban Petrie Terrace.

As commendable as Mrs McConnel's endeavours may have been, the Commission has provided no evidence as to why the name Brisbane Central should be replaced by McConnel.

All mainland states contain a central capital city seat bearing the name of the capital itself. In the Queensland Parliament there has been a district based on the central city since 1859, beginning with the district of Town of Brisbane.

There is no justification for removing this central identifying feature of Queensland's parliamentary heritage. Limited boundary changes have reinforced the nature of this inner city district.

The Liberal National Party recommends that the name Brisbane Central be retained.

G. Proposed McMaster

The Commission recommends changing the name of the existing district of Burdekin to McMaster. Despite the loss of electors in the north and the gain of electors in the south and south west, this redrawn district remains a Burdekin River based district with its centre, albeit not its geographic centre, being Ayr and Home Hill and associated towns.

Burdekin was created in 1950 from the then existing districts of Bowen and Mundingburra and has been centred on Ayr and Home Hill throughout that period.

Burdekin is a recognised name, both in north Queensland and throughout the state. Proposed changes to the district's boundaries do not alter its essential character and there is merit in retaining a long-standing identifiable name for a distinctly north Queensland electoral district.

On the other hand, Sir Fergus McMaster, in view of his accomplishments in the formation of QANTAS, is more readily identified with the western areas of the state.

The Liberal National Party recommends the retention of the name Burdekin.

OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

H. Proposed Miller

The Commission has recommended changing the name of the existing district of Yeerongpilly to Miller.

The redrawn district will include areas of the existing district of Indooroopilly south of the Brisbane River as well as parts of the existing Yeerongpilly. The localities of Yeerongpilly and Tennyson are located at the centre of the proposed district.

In this instance the essential nature of the district has been retained despite the changes in boundaries that have been recommended. While the name Yeerongpilly is relatively new (district created from the renamed Yeronga in 2001), it is well established and widely recognised as a significant locality name.

In proposing that the district be renamed Miller the Commission appears to have allocated a name with little reference to any connection between the individual concerned and the area. Indeed, it could be thought that the name honours the late Col Miller, former Liberal MLA for Ithaca from 1966 to 1986.

While Mrs Miller appears to have been a fervent advocate for her causes, there is little evidence that her endeavours were in any way particularly directed towards the interests of the people who were living within the boundaries of the proposed district.

The Liberal National Party recommends the retention of the name Yeerongpilly.

I. Proposed Oodgeroo

There are only limited proposals made in respect of the existing district of Cleveland. As a consequence, it remains based on bayside residential suburbs as it has since its creation in 1992 from the then district of Redlands.

However, the Commission has taken the opportunity to change the name to Oodgeroo. It is somewhat difficult to comprehend why, when very limited boundary changes are recommended, that the name of the district should be altered.

Cleveland is a well established district name with the suburb of Cleveland being the retail and administrative centre of both the district and the City of Redlands. There is a strong sense of community identity which revolves around Cleveland itself and the broader Redlands community.

While Oodgeroo Noonuccal is widely recognised as a poet and activist, there do not seem to be compelling reasons to remove the name Cleveland. The fact that the changes proposed by the Commission are extremely limited lessens any valid reasons to change the name of the district at this time.

The Liberal National Party recommends the retention of the name Cleveland.

J. Proposed Theodore

The proposed district of Theodore is drawn substantially from the existing district of Albert and the Commission has proposed that it be named after the former Queensland Premier and Federal Treasurer, Edward Theodore.

OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED DISTRICT NAMES

This is another instance of the individual being honoured having had absolutely no relationship with the area under consideration. Mr Theodore's entire Queensland parliamentary career was based in north Queensland while he represented the inner Sydney seat of Dalley in Federal Parliament after he left Queensland.

Mr Theodore was subject to allegations surrounding what is now known as the Mungana Affair and adverse findings were made by a subsequent Royal Commission. The facts surrounding this unsavoury business are outlined in *The Mungana Affair* by K.H.Kennedy (UQP, St Lucia, 1978) and more recently in *The Curse of Mungana* by David Moore (Boolarong Press, Brisbane, 2017). The matter remains unresolved but serious doubts remain as to Mr Theodore's integrity.

In the circumstances, and having regard to the fact that Mr Theodore made his mark as a New South Wales based politician, it would be absolutely inappropriate to name a new district after him.

Compounding this difficulty is the fact that the town of Theodore is located in central Queensland, 565 kilometres north west of Brisbane. As with the proposed district of Macalister, the naming of a Gold Coast district so far from the town bearing the same name would create confusion and uncertainty.

With this in mind the retention of the name Albert is suggested. While it is acknowledged that the Albert River no longer forms part of the boundary of the seat, the name reflects a wider application. The district covers part of the area included in the former Albert Shire and the name Albert has been part of the Queensland parliamentary landscape since the 19th century. The name was revived in 1960 and covered the northern section of the Gold Coast.

To preserve this historic name the Liberal National Party recommends the retention of the name Albert.

K. Proposed Tibrogargan

The Commission has proposed the name of the existing district of Glass House be changed to Tibrogargan – after Mount Tibrogargan, one of the Glass House Mountains. At the same time, the boundary changes have not changed the character of the district which remains based on the Sunshine Coast hinterland towns.

The extent of these changes does not support a change in the district's name. Indeed, Glass House is a well recognised district name. It has a wider currency than Tibrogargan which is just one of seven hills in the district. The Glass House Mountains are visible along the Bruce Highway and provide a distinct reference point in the electoral district.

There is no compelling reason to change the name from Glass House to Tibrogargan. While the district was first created in 1986, it has existed in its current form since 2001. Because of the strength of its connection to the local community it should be retained. Naming the district after one of the Glass House Mountains alone increases the likelihood that the name may have to be changed at the next redistribution should the boundaries change again.

Keeping the name Glass House adds a degree of certainty and connection that it is difficult to replace.

The Liberal National Party recommends the name Glass House be retained.

The Moreton Bay Regional Council respectfully submits that the Queensland Redistribution Commission change the name of the proposed state electorate from "D'Aguilar" to "Pine Rivers". Use of the suggested name of "Pine Rivers" would recognise the long history and association of this nomenclature with this proposed electorate. It would reference the history of the local government entity - which covered this proposed electorate - from 1888 until 2008 (when it amalgamated with the Caboolture Shire and Redcliffe City Councils to form the Moreton Bay Regional Council). The suggested name would also reference the geographic features of the site - namely the three rivers contained within the proposed electorate area: the Pine River, which empties into Bramble Bay, and its tributaries; the North Pine River; and South Pine River. Finally, Council submits that the name "D'Aguilar" may be slightly confusing for residents of our region given the township of D'Aguilar and the D'Aguilar Highway are actually 15 kilometres outside the proposed electorate. Whilst it is acknowledged the D'Aguilar National Park does sit adjacent of the western boundary of the proposed electorate, the majority of the park is outside it - being mainly situated within the proposed Nanango electorate. D'Aguilar National Park is also within proposed Lockyer, Moggill and Cooper electorates. Similar locational challenges apply to D'Aguilar Range (ie located largely outside the proposed electorate). Accordingly, Council submits that the Pine River system is far more unique to the proposed electorate than the D'Aguilar National Park or D'Aguilar Range. In closing, Council requests the proposed state electorate of "D'Aguilar" retain the name "Pine Rivers" to better reflect the history and geographic features of the area, and to avoid potential confusion for local residents. To Whom It May Concern,

We must take the proposed amalgamation of Mount Isa and Dalrymple electorates very seriously. My name is Sam Daniels and I was born in Cloncurry. My family have operated one of Queensland's largest private stock and station agencies for 50 years. Also, my family own and operate six cattle stations totalling over 3 million acres of cattle country, all within the boundaries of the Mount Isa electorate.

Over a period of 40 years, I have witnessed a slow decline in all Government services, from the privatisation of Telstra and Queensland Rail to positions within Main Roads and the Department of Natural Resources and Mines being relocated to major cities on the East coast. Local hospitals have struggled to find funding. Our area has a huge fly in fly out population who are not only miners but also Government employees. All of these people depend on our services and the mines depend on our roads and rail network, and the health network. These people are not counted in our population but use our services. To grow and understand our electorate, you need a big understanding of the scale and different industries that operate here. There is no way one person could do the job that is required and in the best interest of the Seat and the State. This is why there should be NO amalgamation. We should be looking to have one more electorate, not combining two. If the Government decides to amalgamate, we will lose one member and another voice. There will be no savings to the State budget – it will be worse off. The State Government appears intent on reducing the number of democratic voices in North-West Queensland.

We must all remember about the massive amount of royalties these 2 electorates contribute to the State – \$760 million. We need three members to fight hard for our region to grow and to cover the area properly, and listen to the concerns of the voters. Not all voters live in Mount Isa. They are spread all over 490,048km², an area bigger than the United Kingdom. If there is only one member, it is 700km from East to West and 800km from North to South – how

can 1 person possibly successfully cover such a massive area? A lot of people in this area also do not have internet access or mobile phone coverage. If 1 representative was to successfully cover this huge area, this will ultimately become a workplace health and safety issue due to the amount of travel required, not to mention all of the tax payers expenses required to fund this travel.

I am asking the electoral commission to have a vote to decide. We NEED 3 seats, not 1.

We have put an online petition together and have realised a lot of people did not know what was going on with the seat of Traeger. Some actually thought it was simply a name change for the Federal seat of Kennedy. Once again, the State Government doesn't understand the size of the seat and have not got the message out to the people who it will affect – the voters. It was for this reason that I started the online petition. I know that if we had started a month earlier, 80 per cent of people would disagree with an amalgamation. In this petition, we have the support of our regional mayors from Cloncurry, McKinlay, Boulia, Richmond, Flinders, Burketown and Carpentaria Shires.

The North-West is a huge part of Queensland's prosperity and if it gets 3 members to represent it, Queensland will grow. It should not be about the population, it should be based around the size of the electorate boundaries, and there should be more discussions including local mayors and Local Governments. The decision should not be made or decided by Labour, LNP or Independents, but by the voters. All we ask for is some fairness.

However I do not believe that population, even with a 2% variation of the total Electorate area, is the appropriate determinant for electoral boundaries in the State's extensive remote areas. The use of population creates areas on parity by population but with significant disparity in the ability of the Elected Member to appropriately service that area and their constituents.
Whilst size of an electorate cannot be the primary consideration when determining boundaries, the extensive size of Traegar makes it very difficult for the Elected Member to effectively engage and garner the opinions of his/her constituents, ascertain and maintain knowledge as to the relevance of issues in the Electorate and represent those in Parliament. Conversely, it also makes it difficult for the Elected Member to effectively convey back to his electorate information and messaging from the Queensland Government. The power of representation to and from Parliament is radically decreased. If subjected to the "BBQ Test" i.e. how many functions enabling constituent engagement could an urban MP attend over the course of a weekend in comparison to a rural/remote MP, the number would clearly show the inability of the latter to realistically engage once, let alone repeatedly, with his constituents despite having approximately the same number of constituents.
I firmly believe such remote areas would be better distributed if electorates were aligned along common East-West corridors. The East-West polarity reflects connectedness between road infrastructure and, frequently, commonalities in issues, challenges and regional development priorities and opportunities.

We were not surprised to receive the comments we did. We have chosen some very valuable and accurate comments and attached them here.

Nancy Dodd – “Why do the State Government not see that proposing that the Electorates of Mt Isa and Dalrymple is just a Disaster for All. We are crying out every day with Neglect from the State and Federal Governments now. Where were The Government when the Drought was so fierce in Our Region, Not a Sound or Word. Fly In or Fly Out - Where does leave the Locals for Employment Ambitions? NOW, We have been given this very Unfair Representation of the State Government Proposed new ELECTORATE called Traeger - if the Government knew Their History They would be insulting Mr Traeger, Because He was a man who was about COMMUNICATION! Everyone Please do your Research on the Map of Queensland and see the area that is proposed for Our ELECTORATE. If we do not sign a petition and let Our Voices be heard, This will be another State Government Statement of "We don't care about Rural Queenslanders"”

Kate – “Give regional Qld the recognition and representation it provides. Our areas financial contribution to the economy is surely worth its weight in at least 3 electorates. Prove that regional Qld is actually a part of the state's concern and not an insignificant thorn in the governments backside. We aren't going away and you shouldn't continually encourage this unhealthy detachment between regional QLD and the south east corner.”

Kathryn Wilson – “We need to have enough representation, we have a lot of different industries and sectors in a large area. How is one person supposed to support mining, farming, transport, small business, large industries, and keep everyone happy?”

Cathie Bojack – “Absolutely ridiculous to ask 1 person to cover the needs of all the residents of a shire so large. Stop looking at numbers of people living in this area and start looking at the practicalities of servicing an area so incredibly big. Send some of the decision makers out to actually drive around the area - you'll soon understand why this decision is ludicrous!!”

Wayne Fallen – “To be adequately represented in the Queensland parliament, the rural and regional areas require this action. The current electoral boundary structure is not providing full and proper representation of the rural and regional as evidenced by the decline in populations and economies of the rural sector in Queensland.”

Frank Townley – “Once again the North is shown how little we are valued. Our railway networks sold off, our telecommunications support 400km away at the closest, our government officers closed and centralised in cities.”

Brad Tassell – “Typical Brisbane mentality forgetting the people in regional Queensland. I would love to see a Brisbane pollie come out here and travel the electorate and see how they feel after it - would take them 2 weeks. They either don't get it or just don't care”

Cr Belinda Murphy – “All the points being made are valid and lead to one single fact the proposed electorate of Tregar is an impossible size to represent the people that live in this great part of Queensland. Somewhere along the line the benchmark has to move and population based policy has to stop drowning out the minority's right to be heard and issues that are regionally important to long term sustainability and liveability are taken into account.”

Sophie Keily – “Please seriously consider the wealth that the region brings into this state and the need for effective representation to assist the ongoing success of this. By decreasing the size of the electorate not increasing it we can get a better result, the distances that our member travels is downright dangerous, we need some foresight and long term planning which will benefit both the region and the state as a whole. Less people in this region to represent does not equal less work or opportunity, we are sitting on a huge mining and pastoral sector that has not got anywhere near its potential due to limited infrastructure and governance. Let's stop playing politics and work to doing what's right in the longer term.”

Cr Ernie Camp – “I concur that with the changing demographic of the State it is timely to revisit Electoral District Boundaries. However I do not believe that population, even with a 2% variation of the total Electorate area, is the appropriate determinant for electoral boundaries in the State's extensive remote areas. The use of population creates areas on parity by population but with significant disparity in the ability of the Elected Member to appropriately service that area and their constituents. Whilst size of an electorate cannot be the primary consideration when determining boundaries, the extensive size of Traegar makes it very difficult for the Elected Member to effectively engage and garner the opinions of his/her constituents, ascertain and maintain knowledge as to the relevance of issues in the Electorate and represent those in Parliament. Conversely, it also makes it difficult for the Elected Member to effectively convey back to his electorate information and messaging from the Queensland Government. The power of representation to and from Parliament is radically decreased. If subjected to the BBQ Test, i.e. how many functions enabling constituent engagement could an urban MP attend over the course of a weekend in comparison to a rural/remote MP, the number would clearly show the inability of the latter to realistically engage once, let alone repeatedly, with

his constituents despite having approximately the same number of constituents. I firmly believe such remote areas would be better distributed if electorates were aligned along common East-West corridors. The East-West polarity reflects connectedness between road infrastructure and, frequently, commonalities in issues, challenges and regional development priorities and opportunities.”

Michelle Newton-Smith – “Anything short of 3 representatives has the potential to adversely impact any number of stakeholders and industries. Having less than 3 representatives sets the individual representatives themselves up for failure, with a knock-on effect for the regions. The sheer size, diversity and geographic dispersion of the region, requires specific attention and representation from individuals who have the depth of knowledge required to identify synergies, collaborate and advance the infrastructure and industry of the region, for all community and interest groups. Rationalisation often seems like a good, cost-efficient strategy on paper with various opportunities to leverage. But at what long-term cost? It is a strategy that - in my opinion - regularly fails to drive sustainable, long-term growth strategies. Take a look at the business case studies from organisational transformations. In most cases, there is a direct correlation between the quality of outcomes and the number of direct reports, areas of responsibility and accountability, one person has. The fewer the representatives, the less focus there can be because they will struggle to keep up with both competing and complementary issues and opportunities. Additionally, they can burn out faster which leads to churn. Churn results in a lack of productivity and so it goes. Perhaps those considering this rationalisation should take the time to analyse lessons from domestic and international industry? If that doesn't convince them, perhaps a look at the reversal of some of the decisions of government here and abroad, might help? It seems to me that less representation = less focus = less achieved = poor outcomes. I vote for 3 reps.”

This submission strongly objects to the proposed redistribution for the existing electoral district of Brisbane Central, now to be renamed McConnel. I strongly oppose the proposed name change, for the reason that the existing name of the district properly and accurately reflects the location of the area, and is consistent with the names of other CBD-based electorates in other cities which are identified by the name of the electorate. Not one elector in the existing electorate I have asked, has been able to identify the name 'McConnel' as being the central city-based electorate in this State. Indeed, no one has been able to correctly identify the person who the proposed name is named after. Secondly, I strongly oppose the proposed boundary change that removes a significant number of electors who have always been in the central city zone, from that zone and transfers them to the Clayfield electorate. Here I am speaking about those residents of Albion and Windsor who reside north of Breakfast Creek and who do not have any affinity or community of interest with Clayfield or suburbs to the east. We overlook the CBD landscape and identify very strongly with the CBD and its community of interests. Very few residents of this area visit Clayfield or Hamilton or Toombul to shop or recreate. They mostly visit the established commercial centres at Lutwyche or Stafford or Fortitude Valley or the CBD. For recreation there is an established park in Windsor that is well utilised by local residents. While recognising the quotas that have been set by the Commission, restoring residents of this area to our existing electorate would not break the limit set by it for Brisbane Central/McConnel, and would reduce the high number that would exist in the proposed Clayfield electorate. An appropriate boundary instead of Breakfast Creek would be the North Coast railway line, so that all who live west of the line and south of Stoneleigh Street Lutwyche would remain in the CBD electorate.

Foreword

The Queensland Greens wish to thank the Boundary Commission for the opportunity to comment on the draft boundaries.

In this submission we will look at the draft boundaries, both in terms of overall and more specific outcomes and make recommendations on potential improvements and identify issues as the party sees them. We will also consider the choices of electorate names that the Commission has adopted.

The Greens would like to thank Judge Botting, Ms Carroll and Mr van der Merwe and their staff for conducting this review with the professionalism and rigour that we have come to expect of appointees to such a difficult and politically sensitive role.

Commentary on Submissions

Overview

In broad terms, the Queensland Greens are supportive of the direction the commission has taken as far as its draft boundaries are concerned. The addition of four new seats made this quite a challenge, however, the commission has managed to engineer boundaries that would at the least have provided a similar if not the same parliamentary outcome from the previous election without introducing too many odd boundaries or unusual collections of communities.

Boundary Issues and Principle of Fairness

In a few cases, the new boundaries are a considerable improvement, such as in the removal of districts south of the Brisbane river from Indooroopilly (now Maiwar). There are also some odd choices as well, for instance the shape of the proposed Murrumba district is wrapped around a section of Bancroft, while forcing Kurwongbah quite far north into the Caboolture region. These choices are undoubtedly due to population growth concerns, but the underlying voting statistics appear to split districts that have a common voting pattern into two districts with very strongly opposing voting patterns, making it hard to envision how those areas could get effective representation. Combined with some odd splits of suburbs, the party believes a slightly different draw of the boundary would better represent the community.

We will make a few suggestions on alternative border draws to address some of these concerns, but overall we are satisfied with the commission's choices in terms of maintaining a relatively fair outcome on similar electoral statistics from previous elections. Both our internal analysis and the analysis performed by Antony Green¹ point towards either a similar result or a slightly better result for the ALP which on balance should be the case as the ALP started with a slight advantage on two party preferred. We also appreciate the effort that the Commission has gone to to limit the malappropriation caused by the Large District Number provisions of the electoral act, both by reducing the proportion of seats that qualify (5.6% then vs 4.3% now) and significantly decreasing the land area of the electorate of Mount Isa/Traeger, though as suggested in the forward estimates of electorate size, the effect may be short lived.

That said, it is still the stated position of the Queensland Greens that the current single member electorate system makes a diverse parliament based on the votes of all electors a near impossibility. This redistribution of seats will be of little comfort to the 220,000 Green Voters; 133,000 Palmer United voters or the 31,000 Family First voters who would in a purely proportional system be entitled to one or more seats in the previous parliament on estimates, but it would continue to be unlikely that any of these groups would win a seat in the new parliament.

Electorate Naming

In previous submissions to Boundary reviews, the Queensland Greens have been supportive of name changes to take in different cultural aspects of Queensland. In regards to the names that step out of the traditional geographical area naming convention common at this level of government, we have no serious concerns and support the commission's choice to go in this direction.

As a general rule, we would have liked the commission to focus on historical figures that had less to do with politics, however, we don't feel that any specific person that has been listed in part 4 is inappropriate. It is a diverse group of people in terms of experiences, professions and gender, though maybe slightly more focused on British colonial history than we would otherwise like. We do appreciate the inclusion of Edward Theodore in this list, while we can only speculate as to the many reasons the commission may have chosen this specific person, we certainly appreciate the idea of immortalising a premier that made an electoral system change that was good for his short term prospects but had significant consequences for the politics in Queensland moving forward. A somewhat timely reminder for our political class.


We have heard media reporting on this topic from some academics and from political parties that significant name changes like these were inappropriate on the grounds that electorates involved have not changed significantly and that it would be confusing to voters. While we are sure there are communities that are protective of the area that they live in, it's doubtful that those communities build their identities around the name of an electorate. As for confusion about the name, we are sure that those with more than a passing interest in politics will adapt and those without will simply not care and do the same as they always have, turn up to their polling booth and cast a vote.

Suggested adjustments

Murrumba/Bancroft/Redcliffe adjustments

The commission rightly identified the problem in this area early; it's got a selection of major growth areas that are growing at different rates. Deciding to split the districts was sound, but it left some communities orphaned from their key community hubs and reinforced the two safe ALP districts by splitting parts where the LNP does better.

The population issue is hard to resolve at this redistribution due to the growth curve in the area, however we are going to suggest a few changes in preparation for a more solid redrafting in 2023. The first is to move all neighbourhoods north of Anzac Avenue inside Kippa-Ring within Redcliffe, moving 700 voters. While we would have preferred to add all of the district, the variance would be too great and will need to wait for the next redistribution. The second is to move the parts of Dakabin and Kallangur that were absorbed into Bancroft back into Murrumba, which means extending the boundary to the Bruce Highway and Boundary Rd. This moves approximately 2,000 voters. The overall change improves the districts only marginally in terms of compactness, but at the very least provides a better split of the community of interest between the districts.



Maiwar/Moggill adjustments

The boundary problems in the Western districts of Brisbane have caused communities of interest that were previously in different electorates joined together. It also somewhat favours the interests of the communities in the southern part of the district over the north; in this regard the seat will always be unbalanced. We are suggesting that a small part of the new district of Maiwar be moved into Moggill to balance the competing interests in the district, complementing it more as a diverse electorate while allowing the excised area to be included in an area more similar in demographic than the current arrangement.

We suggest moving the entire suburb of Fig Tree Pocket from Maiwar to Moggill, moving 2,700 voters in total, and moving the boundary to Cubberla Creek, up to the corner of Jesmond Rd & Jillbra St then east along the boundary of Manaton Park, trading off against 800 voters that live in suburban Indooroopilly that are currently assigned to Moggill, moving the boundary south to Russell Terrace and west to Moggill Rd. While this does take Moggill out to the theoretically largest district size, it does allow for quite a lot of relative population loss, potentially preventing significant changes in the next redistribution.



Noosa/Gympie/Ninderry adjustments

On discussions with members and the community in Cooloola, Rainbow Beach and Inskip, it has been suggested that the boundary draw for Noosa may not meet the community expectations for the area. To rectify the population issues there we are suggesting that the three suburbs mentioned should be returned to Gympie, moving about 800 voters, that changes the border back to the Como/Noosa North Shore district boundary.

We are also suggesting that Peregian should be held within the boundaries of Noosa and suggest a swap. Moving Peregian Beach and Weyba Downs adds 580 voters (moving the southern border down to meet Emu Mountain Rd). As Ninderry is slightly more oversubscribed than Noosa after the movements into Gympie, this should balance the populations slightly.

The abolition of Dalrymple will have a profoundly detrimental impact on the constituents of rural and regional north Queensland.

By breaking Dalrymple into three electorates and absorbing the Charters Towers region into the super-sized seat of Traegar, which is more than double the size of the United Kingdom, constituents will lose vital political representation. The Member for Traegar will have the monumental and virtually impossible task of representing tens of thousands of people across a vast range of industries from the Northern Territory border to Paluma, near the east coast. No person would be able to effectively represent and serve a region of that size, leaving constituents severely under-represented in Parliament.

While the Electoral Commission of Queensland's proposal factors in population growth, it completely overlooks geographical and logistical factors. We believe this proposal is fundamentally flawed and will severely hamstring the sitting member and fail regional communities.

As it stands, our Charters Towers Dalrymple Electorate Office deals with many different constituent issues on a daily basis, covering agriculture, mining, community, housing, health, education and many more. If the region was absorbed into Traegar, these daily constituent enquiries and concerns would be lumped in with hundreds more from a vastly expanded area, from a primary electorate office more than 750 kilometres away. This would mean many constituents' issues would easily fall by the wayside, leaving people feeling forgotten and neglected with nowhere to turn. Many of these people are elderly and/or unwell and rely heavily on support from the Charters Towers office.

Residents in rural and regional Queensland already experience huge disadvantages when it comes to service and resource delivery, and continually fight for Government recognition and support. Losing crucial political representation will leave these regions without a voice. By neglecting these areas, most of which are highly productive and valuable, rural businesses and industries could break down because they're not receiving adequate support. This would severely impact the state's economy and have disastrous flow-on effects to bigger regional and metropolitan centres. More seats should be added to central and north Queensland, not less.

Setting up new electorate offices in the redrawn electorates would also incur a hefty cost to the Government. The costs involved in setting up new offices and recruiting and training

staff will be a phenomenal drain on the public purse and take considerable time and effort. Meanwhile, constituents won't be receiving the level of service they require from their electorate office.

The proposed change to electoral boundaries is deeply flawed and fails to meet the needs of the constituents of rural and regional Queensland. These communities are vital to Australia's social fabric and it is imperative they are looked after and adequately represented in Parliament.


The Members of Tully Cane Growers Ltd supply 80 percent of the sugar cane supply to the Tully Sugar Mill, and as the organisation which represents their interests, we make a submission on the proposed oral boundary change to the Electorate of Hinchinbrook.

- A number of years ago, the Local Government areas of Johnstone and Cardwell were amalgamated to form the Cassowary Coast Regional Council. While this was disruptive and unpopular with many of our members at the time, the whole mill area remained under one Local Government. The proposed boundary change will mean that the Local Government area of the Cassowary Coast Region (CCR) will be split between two State Government Electorates.
- Having united this area of the CCR in terms of its Local Government representation almost a decade ago, it is difficult to understand the logic behind dividing it again, in terms of its State Government representation.
- The proposed changes would move the northern boundary of Hinchinbrook from the outskirts of Innisfail to south of Tully, dramatically dividing the CCR. In particular, the agricultural and farming areas in both the southern and northern regions of the CCR have very similar communities of interest, specifically our schools and sugar mill supply, which will be divided.
- Cardwell, Kennedy, Bilyana, Murray Upper, Euramo, Tully Gorge Road and Lower Tully will be in a different electorate than their major service centre Tully, which is proposed to be part of the new seat of Hill.
- It is difficult to understand why Tully Heads and Hull Heads are proposed to go into Hill, yet to get there they will have to drive through the Hinchinbrook Electorate (Lower Tully) to get to their local service centre in Tully.

- The agricultural farming areas in the southern area of the CCR have significant ties to the northern farming areas of the CCR and there are many instances where land ownership is common. Our members have significant ties to the township of Tully through its sugar mill, schools and commercial sector; the proposed redistribution would see these sectors split into separate State Electorates making it more difficult to lobby for a common interest.
- The proposed electoral boundaries have chosen roads as a boundary rather than the Tully River, which would mean that in many cases our members would reside in one electorate while their farms are in another.
- We believe that the interest of our members would be better served if they remained in an electorate that had a strong base in wet tropical agriculture such as cane and bananas. The proposal would shift the northern area to the Electorate of Hill which would have a strong economic interest in agriculture west of the coastal ranges. The CCR does not have the same established economic and community connections with the Atherton Tablelands, being separated from the coast by the coastal ranges and have a different climate. Our organisation and members are involved with Reef issues that are aligned with the Wet Tropics and as such have closer ties with the Coastal industries.

We do not believe that the Commission has properly considered the communities of interest criteria properly and urges it to reconsider the northern boundary of Hinchinbrook to include Tully and communities further north that supply sugar cane to Tully Mill.

I believe that the proposed electoral boundary realignment of Buderim so that it would include Minyama, Parrearra and Buddina is poorly thought through and has the potential for significant downside to businesses in these areas using the name Kawana as part of their marketing. An unnecessary dilution of a trading name will likely create adverse outcomes. Please note that Kawana Waters is an official place name. It includes the area between Mooloolah River in the north and Currimundi Creek in the south and encompasses all the beaches between. There is a sense of common urban heritage and a long-standing social connectedness to the area. This connection has been forged in large part by the location of the Kawana Shopping Centre in the northern part of the electorate since 1978. There is very much a community of interest which I have observed at first hand having been an integral and active part of this urbanisation and community-building since 1972 when as the local newsagency I watched the area grow and develop. The proposed disconnection of Minyama, Buddina and Parrearra from the Kawana electorate disrupts and dilutes this concept of "place". This sense of place would also have roots for the areas traditional owners the Undumbi people. This coastal stretch of suburbs deservedly should retain its identity not least because they are linked by a single uninterrupted 10km stretch of beach reinforcing the identity. Existing names of cultural icons such as Kawana Surf Club, Kawana RSL, Kawana Shopping Town, Kawana Library and many more exist and provide the community focus and connectiveness so vital to social cohesion. I am concerned that moving Minyama, Buddina and Parrearra into the Buderim electorate will cause the locals to lose true "on the ground representation" and they will be forced into an electorate where they will be largely unseen & voiceless, forced to drive to the top of Buderim to see their local MP. The Kawana electorate and the Buderim electorate are diverse & different; the one coastal and urban, the other with a hinterland location between the business districts of Maroochydore and Nambour. CANEGROWERS Herbert River represents some 550 cane growing entities who collectively supply some 92% of the cane supply for the only two sugar mills in the region, both owned by Wilmar Sugar Australia Limited. The sugar product produced from the annual crop grown in the Herbert is shipped to export markets through the port of Lucinda where an industry owned bulk sugar storage and handling facility is situated featuring a 5.76 km long offshore jetty to a deep water loading berth that requires no maintenance dredging. The Bulk Sugar terminal facility itself is an infrastructure asset that lends itself to exploitation for additional purposes consistent with its long term maintenance for its primary use. The Hinchinbrook electorate has considerable common interest with the sugar producing communities encompassing the cane areas supplying the Tully mill and also the cane areas supplying the South Johnstone mill. In terms of local government the electorate contains a significant part of the Cassowary Coast Regional Council, all of the Hinchinbrook Shire Council and the northern part of the Townsville Regional Council. It is submitted that the proposed boundary changes will considerably change the character of the electorate which raises concerns for the representation of legitimate community of interest for the productive industry that supports the jobs, the economies and communities that have grown up around the industry. The concern is that the infusion if a large urban area to the south with virtually no common interest with the vast parts of the electorate could weaken the representation of the industry and supported communities which contribute substantial annual export earnings to Queensland's economy. It is submitted that the boundaries should be realigned such that more of the northern primary producing farmed areas that were proposed to be taken out to add to the Hill electorate should remain in Hinchinbrook and be offset with a reduction in the area of Townsville/Thuringowra to achieve the required quota for the electorate. A similar submission is offered in regard to the inclusion of Palm Island which although geographically accessible to Hinchinbrook, has historical connection to Townsville as a trading centre and point of access to health, education and other services. It is therefore submitted that Palm Island remain in the Townsville Electorate. It is appreciated that there are numerous interests that require representation in addition to industry and it is submitted that an electorate will be far more functional if there are fewer conflicting sub communities within the electorate which is why CANEGROWERS Herbert River makes the submission it has in regard to recommended changes to the proposed boundaries.



ECQ Redistribution 2017 – Objections / Commentary from BDCDA

Thank you for the opportunity to make this submission on the QRC Proposal for Redistribution of the State's Electoral Districts 2017.

Who We Are

Beenleigh District Community Development Association Incorporated (BDCDA) is a not-for-profit community-based organisation located within the proposed electorate of Macalister. We are an Income Tax Exempt Charity (ITEC), with Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status at the ATO, formed under Queensland's Associations Incorporation Act.

BDCDA operates the Beenleigh Neighbourhood Centre and the Beenleigh Supported Accommodation Service (a housing project for homeless families – which operates houses historically under the purview of Commissioner Liza Carroll's Department (Housing and Public Works) as well as the Queensland Department of Communities).

Our housing service was established as Albert and Logan Community Care in November 1983. The neighbourhood centre was originally the Beenleigh Senior Citizens Centre (before they relocated to their current Alamein St address). Our older building was relocated onsite and dedicated by Governor Sir Alan Mansfield in 1967 (with our Golden Jubilee – 50 years – being 15 April 2017, Easter Saturday). The building reopened as the Beenleigh Neighbourhood Centre in May 1985. The two bodies amalgamated in 1999.

BDCDA – under its role as the Beenleigh Neighbourhood Centre – is the Department of Communities' core funded locality-based centre for Beenleigh itself. We have operated houses for homeless families across Beenleigh, Eagleby, Mt Warren Park, Bethania and Holmview over the past 33 years (and still counting).

When Gold Coast City Council developed its Social Plan in 2006, we were the only group north of the Coomera River invited to serve on the planning committee. When the Department of Premier and Cabinet established the Ministerial Regional Communities Forum in the early 2000s, our then Community Development Officer was nominated to the South-East Queensland (South) Forum as a Sport, Recreation and Culture delegate.

We have participated in the Beenleigh Urban Renewal Project and the Community Renewal process (on both the Health and Wellbeing and Housing working groups).

We have been active in community interagency work for decades. We were members for many years of the Beenleigh Yatala Chamber of Commerce (and we have recently reactivated our membership).

Before their respective elections to public office, our Management Committee members have included Tom Barton (later MP for Waterford), Margaret Keech (later MP for Albert), Michael Crandon (later MP for Coomera) and Evan Moorhead (later MP for Waterford). Our past patrons have included Bill Baumann (then MP for Albert), Cr Tom Costigan, Cr Ray Hackwood, Cr Jennie Breene (present) and Mayor Pam Parker. Our previous Honorary Solicitor was Shannon Fentiman (also later MP for Waterford).

We are a community-minded and deeply engaged local organisation.

Our Community – and the ECQ Proposal

Beenleigh is key to this region and to our organisation. The township of Beenleigh was established as the geologically stable platform between the surrounding alluvial farming country along the Logan and Albert Rivers. Beenleigh is where a railway station could be built on solid ground to service the farmland and the through traffic route. In the local Yugambah language, Beenleigh's name is Wobbumarjoo ("the place of boggy clay").

Before the M1 was built, the main coastal road came directly through Beenleigh. Starting at the Logan Rd corner outside The Gabba cricket ground, the road continued through southern Brisbane and Logan before reaching Beenleigh and continuing to the Gold Coast area. (This was also a Cobb & Co coach route.)

Before the railway and the roads were established, the rivers were the thoroughfares – and George St, Beenleigh, continues through Eagleby to what was once Wharf St (where the boats docked to take goods up to Brisbane). ***It is the roads and the rivers that have been understood as our local boundaries for the past 150 years.***

Beenleigh and Eagleby have been conjoined areas since European settlement. The placement of the M1 motorway between them has been used – unfortunately - as an electoral boundary over recent years. However, the communities of interest between Eagleby and Beenleigh (east-west) are much stronger than the links Eagleby has developed to any other community on either side of its encompassing rivers and there are several road and pedestrian/cycle links between them (across and under the M1).

Beenleigh and Eagleby are within the same Chamber of Commerce, the same local government Division (12, Logan City Council) and the same Federal electorate (Forde). They share many sporting teams at both junior and senior levels. They are part of the same parish for the Catholic, Anglican and Uniting Churches. Many charities and service providers cover both localities with the same delivery teams and from the same offices.

Putting Eagleby in a different State electorate to Beenleigh (as has been the case since the 2000 ECQ redistribution: first into Albert, then into Coomera) is not the preferred option for residents. BDCDA welcomes the ECQ Proposal re-joining these suburbs into the new seat of Macalister and would oppose any revision that might split them apart.

BDCDA formerly covered the entire region in service delivery for the Department of Communities. Our 2001 Service Agreement for Beenleigh Neighbourhood Centre defined our footprint as being "the region bounded in the north by the Logan River, in the east by Moreton Bay, in the south by the Coomera River and in the west by the Waterford/Tamborine Mountain Rd." (2001 CISP Service Plan between BDCDA Inc and Qld Dept of Communities)

As the department changed its own administrative boundaries, they became much less prescriptive in their application to us. BDCDA now covers an area merely defined as "Beenleigh and surrounding area". (2012 CSS Service Plan between BDCDA Inc and Qld Dept of Communities)

To enable us to target more directly our service delivery, BDCDA conducts a biennial Community Needs Analysis for the Department of Communities.

Our 2015 CNA identified a key target area comprising of the suburbs of Eagleby, Beenleigh, Mt Warren Park, Edens Landing-Holmview and Wolffdene-Bahrs Scrub.

These areas constituted a socio-economic community of interest in our assessment (advantageously, falling within the same local government area: Logan City Council).

BDCDA welcomes the ECQ Proposal that places Eagleby, Beenleigh, Mt Warren Park, Edens Landing and Holmview within the same electorate – being the new seat of Macalister. We would oppose any revision that might split this conurbation.

We would also suggest including the suburb of Bahrs Scrub in the new seat of Macalister – if the quota calculations permit. We suspect that it would not be feasible to extend this out to Belivah and Wolffdene and still maintain the balance the ECQ is trying to achieve so we do not make that recommendation.

BDCDA's planning processes identified the currently peri-urban localities of Bahrs Scrub and Wolffdene as completing our own service delivery heartland. We could have also (or alternatively) included Windaroo and Waterford (with the fast-growing Delfin Woodlands Estate) and Bethania in our target area. They were each a part of our historic and original footprint and are still parts of the notional area we service today.

However, we considered the demographic data available to identify community needs that required more direct and targeted attention from the Department of Communities and BDCDA (as the funded local service).

The ECQ Proposal includes part of both Waterford and Bethania in Macalister. BDCDA does not necessarily object to that suggestion and recognises the need to gain sufficient population to ensure the stability of local boundaries up to (and, hopefully, after) the next redistribution.

With the proposed inclusion of Bahrs Scrub, BDCDA supports the ECQ Proposal for the southern boundary of Macalister (if that is in keeping with enrolment requirements).

BDCDA notes the preference to keep suburbs intact (wherever possible) and to keep electorates within a single local government area (wherever possible).

For these reasons, ***BDCDA would object to the inclusion of Yatala (part of the Gold Coast City Council area) into any proposed revision for Macalister; or for any other area currently part of the City of the Gold Coast to be included in Macalister.***

Keeping Macalister as a southern Logan City seat makes sense to us.

BDCDA, however, is concerned that the ECQ Proposal boundary for Bethania and Waterford is inconsistent and unworkable.

The localities of Bethania and Waterford are split in a way that does not match the Logan City Council suburb boundary or the underlying principles of the ECQ Proposal (which otherwise keeps whole suburbs together within Macalister).

If Bethania could remain entirely within one electorate, either Waterford (where it has been situated historically) or Macalister, that would be the preference of BDCDA.

This would place the industrial estate between Logan River Rd and High Rd (including Aldi and Bunnings) - which appears a sizeable area on the map but which contains negligible numbers of electors – within the same electorate as the rest of Bethania.

It looks, at first glance, as if Iona Ct, Natone Ct and Black Diamond Cres are split between Bethania and Edens Landing - but we believe the suburb boundary is behind the housing through the middle of Ridgewood Reserve. For all 3 named streets, all enrolled addresses show as Edens Landing, not as Bethania (so it would be possible to use the Bethania-Edens Landing suburb boundary as an electorate boundary).

The locality of Waterford has been split by the ECQ Proposal.

This makes more sense than splitting Bethania as the historic locality of Waterford is now diverging between the suburban Woodlands estate and the peri-urban acreage properties beyond that estate. Placing the higher-density area into Macalister and the lower-density area into Waterford is not ideal but it is an acceptable option for now.

Our primary concern for the western Macalister boundary is the current ECQ Proposal line of delineation which splits Palm Lake Resort (a retirement living community).

Located on both sides of the old Beaudesert rail line, northern Palm Lake Resort is in Bethania and southern Palm Lake Resort is in Waterford. The 2 halves of the estate share roadways and facilities (within a common fence line). We believe it would be unacceptable and unmanageable to draw an electorate boundary THROUGH the middle of a retirement community.

BDCDA proposes for ECQ to keep both parts of Palm Lake Resort (and the unrelated but neighbouring RSL Talbarra retirement community as well as Canterbury College) within the electorate of Waterford - by using the extension of High Rd and Easterly St to form the new boundary with the electorate of Macalister. (A map is attached.)

This would achieve the option of splitting Delfin Woodlands from the remainder of Waterford locality (beyond the two retirement communities and the school site).

It might be appropriate for the Department of Natural Resources to consider renaming the Woodlands part of the Waterford locality at a future date (as was done for a portion of Slacks Creek a decade ago) to better distinguish the electorate boundary at both Council and State level.

BDCDA notes the ECQ Proposal to include Loganholme (east of the M1) and the suburbs of Cornubia and Carbrook within the new electorate of Macalister.

While these might constitute a community of interest for BDCDA's Management Committee (with several of our members coincidentally living in the northern part of Macalister), we are not sure that they are the best fit with the rest of the new seat (south of the Logan River).

However, as any other conceivable extensions of Macalister might involve crossing the Logan River west of the M1 (an equally complicated option) or crossing the Albert River into the Gold Coast City Council area (not the preferred choice on principle) or otherwise distorting the shape and community of interest of the coherent core of Macalister or unbalancing (from the established quotas) the neighbouring seats of Springwood, Redlands, Coomera or Logan, BDCDA accepts the ECQ Proposal as the most workable option visible in the current redistribution.

The Name of the Seat

BDCDA welcomes the Commission's approach (as stated on page 5 of the Proposal) to use Indigenous names wherever possible; to avoid place-based names and the names of living or recently deceased persons.

BDCDA notes the proposed name of Macalister for this new seat – after early Premier Arthur Macalister.

We note the state-wide application of his name (as Premier) which has been a principle also used to name the Gold Coast seat of Theodore (after Edward Granville Theodore).

However, Macalister was a politician based primarily in the Ipswich area (where the new seat has already been proposed to be named after Vi Jordan – which we support).

Macalister's nickname was "Slippery Mac" (as the Commission's own Report states), not an endearing term to identify a new electorate.

BDCDA wishes to propose that the ECQ considers one of the following alternate names for this new electorate:

- ***Jinndi*** – which means "nest" in the local Yugambeh language: a fitting term for an area closely connected with the nesting grounds of eagles.
- ***Plunkett*** – two of the earliest Members for Albert (the 1st and 3rd; and the 5th) were a father and son surnamed Plunkett who initially lived in this district and who, between them, represented the area in State Parliament for 45 years.
- ***Bilin Bilin*** – the name of a Yugambeh elder here at the time of European settlement. His descendants include the local Williams family. Aunty Robyn Williams is a cultural educator at state schools within the electorate (especially Eagleby South). Aunty Robyn's brother, Uncle Ted Williams, earlier this month accompanied Premier Anastacia Palaszczuk and Gold Coast Mayor Tom Tate to Buckingham Palace to help Her Majesty start the Queen's Baton Relay for the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games. Bilin Bilin is our preference.

These are names BDCDA has used for meeting rooms in the Beenleigh Neighbourhood Centre (with the corresponding wall signs attached to this submission).

The Jinndi Room


The word *Jinndi* means “nest”
in the local Yugambah language.

The name of Eagleby (our sister suburb):
*“Local legend suggests that some early settlers
asked a local aboriginal what his people called
the eagles nesting near the mouth of the Albert River.
He replied “Eagle be Mothchya” and the name stuck.”*

In this building, The Jinndi Room is “the nesting space”
for many of our most active groups and programs.



Thomas Plunkett MLA, 1905

Thomas Plunkett (1840 - 1913) arrived in Queensland in the ship Fiery Star in 1863 and took up a selection at Waterford. In 1869 he bought a property on the Albert River near Tamborine where he engaged in dairy-farming, grazing and crop-growing, and also established a general store. He won the (new) seat of Albert in the Legislative Assembly in 1888 and held it until 1908, save for one term (1896 - 1899). He backed co-operative initiatives by farmers. The Plunkett Room

Named after *Thomas Plunkett*, local farmer and first (and third) elected Member for Albert in the Legislative Assembly of Queensland

(17th May 1888 - 21st March 1896; 18th March 1899 - 5th February 1908)

His son, *Thomas Flood Plunkett*, followed him into public service as the 5th MLA for Albert and the 1st MLA for Darlington, serving local residents continuously for 28 years *(11th May 1929 - 3rd August 1957)*.



The Bilin Bilin Room

Named after *Bilin Bilin*, Elder of the Yugambah peoples. He was born here in the early 1800 (and was a leader of his people well before European settlement of this district).

"He watched the arrival of the timber cutter, the explorer, the missionary and the surveyor, all of whom needed his assistance for his survival. He debated with the missionary. He demanded equality of wages for his people and he would have encouraged them not to work without payment."

(Best, Ysola., in Poignant Regalia, by Tania Cleary, p.15)

"Bilin Bilin was [given]... a free rail pass so he could visit his eldest daughter, Emily Jacky, near Beaudesert. Emily married Willie Williams, a Mununjali Aborigine, and cared for orphaned children of the Logan tribe ...

Bilin Bilin died in 1901. It is believed he was buried seated in an upright position, in a high rocky shelter overlooking the Albert River in the nesting place of eagles."

Axe made of basalt. Photo: George Serras.

This axe was found in the heart of Bilin Bilin's country, between the Albert and Logan Rivers...

It was found by Bilin Bilin's great-great-great grandson, Hague Best. Hague is an Indigenous Cultural Heritage Officer with the Gold Coast City Council.

After a day spent on an archaeological dig, he was examining the finds, including a couple of broken axe pieces he had found 20 metres apart.

When he held the axe fragments together he suddenly realised they were the two halves of the same axe.

It is now part of the collection of the Yugambah Museum...

The axe is made of from a flake of basalt rock, ground on sandstone to sharpen it.

Sometimes axes are attached to handles but the lack of marks on the axe shows it never had a handle.


It would have been used for a range of purposes - to chop wood, strip bark, butcher large animals, as a weapon or a ceremonial item.

The edges of the axe are quite worn so it has been well-used. Axes were a valuable possession and a trade item.

There is also wear on the broken edge that shows the break happened a long time ago...



I write as the State Member for Logan to support the Australian Labor Party's submission regarding the State District of Logan because that submission better addresses the matters that the Redistribution Commission must consider in section 46 (1).

When considering the southern parts of Logan, it is vital to understand that the North-South connections create not only 46 (1)(b) the ways of communication and travel but also 46(a) the communities of economic, social, regional and other interests within the proposed districts. The major roads have also been created to follow the 46(1)(c) physical features namely the Logan and Albert Rivers.

Further 46(1)(d) makes it clear that the boundaries of existing districts should be considered, the ALP submission maintains more people within existing boundaries while strengthening the ways of travel and communication as well as communities of interest.

Algester

The Labor suggestion on the draft reverses the direct swap of population between Algester and Logan. Obviously this is desirable when considering section 46 (1)(c) maintaining existing boundaries. However it also follows a clear physical feature of the Mt Lindesay Highway. The area between Boronia Heights and Regents Park or Hillcrest and Browns Plains is an imposing multi-lane elevated highway that is a clear and existing boundary between the districts of Algester and Logan.

Further, as the draft proposal from the commission maintains Forestdale and Hillcrest on the western side of the highway it makes sense to keep Boronia Heights

with these neighbouring suburbs. Boronia Heights residents have easy connection to their neighbours in Hillcrest via Anzac Avenue.

The Redistribution Commission's draft split the suburb of Regents Park into three districts this would make for considerable confusion as the narrow creek lines do not make for a easy division between boundaries. The division of Regents Park into three parts does not adequately consider any of the subsections of 46(1).

The decision of which electorate in which to put Boronia Heights was clearly a decision that the past Redistribution Commission considered at the previous redistribution. The commission at that time made the decision to take Boronia Heights into Algester after considering section 46 (1) (a), (b), (c). Now as these boundaries have been set for some time the consideration of the existing boundaries makes it clear that Boronia Heights should stay in the division of Algester and Regents Park and Browns Plains in the division of Logan.

Woodridge

Given the decision of the commission to take Waterford Division north in a thin strip over the Slacks Creek industrial area to the unconnected suburban area of Underwood. If this is to be maintained then Woodridge must gain some voters. The movement of Underwood, given its isolation from Waterford was not anticipated by the ALP. I support the submission of the ALP to recognise that voters move on North-South roads on the urban fringe and suggest that the boundary of Logan and Woodridge be set at Bayliss Rd in Heritage Park. Bayliss Rd is a clear boundary and on the road's east there is the Logan Refuse Station and Logan Metro Sports Complex. Further that the area south of Bumstead Rd is best connected via the North South connections of Clarke Rd and especially Chambers Flat Rd.

Waterford

Following the principal that many areas of the urban fringe connect via a North-South Road from the acreage areas to the urban services immediately to the north. The Commission could unite the suburb of Logan Reserve into the one division of Waterford. Logan Reserve is currently split between Waterford where much of the population lives and Logan where the School is located. Most of the ways of communication and travel from the southern part of Logan Reserve are via Chambers Flat Rd and Logan Reserve Rd both of which go into the current division of Waterford.

On the other side of the river south of the suburb of Waterford there are a number of areas around Buccan and Bahrs Scrub that are also closely connected to the suburb and division of Waterford via Waterford-Mt Tamborine Rd. For this area there is currently no way to cross the Logan River without going north into Waterford- the alternative of going south past Logan Village is much less used by residents there. This creates economic and social connection as the Logan River as a physical boundary directs residents to the immediate north. Health, shopping and educational services are all to the north via Waterford Mt Tamborine Rd in the electoral district of Waterford. Bus services travel through this area to train stations to the North. It is

clear that including this area in the division of Waterford better considers the matters outlined in S46(1).

Logan

The southern areas of Logan city are very much governed by North-South connections. The draft version of Logan crosses a variety of ways of travel, and social and economic communities.

- The Mt Lindesay Highway drives one North-South community in Logan from Jimboomba to Grand Plaza.
- Chambers Flat Rd and Logan Reserve Rd provide connection to the north connecting the acreage areas such as Logan Reserve to the suburban services to the north.
- Waterford-Tamborine Rd is a further State Road that is a North-South connection. It is the only one of these North South roads that is to the East of the Logan River. The northern parts of this road that are suggested for the draft electoral district of Logan are isolated from the majority of the suggested Logan by the Logan River, residents have to travel much further down Waterford-Tamborine Rd before accessing a crossing to the West. While all of the educational, shopping, health and other economic and social connections are to the North. Historically the Bridge South of Logan Village was destroyed in 1903 in floods and not restored until 1996. These 93 years without a bridge ensured that there is strong communities of interest to the areas to the immediate north in Waterford.

I have received many comments from constituents that Flagstone has strong links to both Jimboomba and the Mt Lindesay corridor instead of Springfield with which there is no sealed direct road connection at all. While it is unusual to make this decision I am making this submission on the basis that the commission understood that the community of Flagstone this lack of physical connection and felt it was forced to do this because of population requirements. If this is not the case, the commission should make an addendum to make this clear and submissions may be changed on this basis.

Jimboomba is connected to the western part of Logan district clearly via the Mt Lindesay Highway and is part of a community of economic and social interest right up to Browns Plains through the major services and shopping precinct of Grand Plaza. The draft suggestion of splitting Regents Park into three districts is unfortunate and can be corrected through the ALP submission. Further connecting Browns Plains with Regents Park and Heritage Park west of Bayliss Rd makes a clear block that can continue to be part of the Logan district as they have for many years.

Logan reserve has at the last redistribution been unfortunately split through its centre. It should be united in one division and the requirements of the number of electors mean that Logan Reserve is best united in the division of Waterford.

The areas closest to the Beaudesert-Beenleigh Rd are small in number but introduce a fourth major North-South corridor that has limited connection to the other three

corridors. Instead these areas should be in the proposed Coomera district which has areas across the other side of the road. The watershed between the Albert and Logan River valleys is a clear boundary. Further Coomera should also continue up the Albert River along Plunket Rd and also take the suburb of Kairabah, which when developed will utilise Plunket Rd and Beaudesert Beenleigh Rd.

Conclusion



I support the ALP suggestions to the draft proposal. The map to the left highlights that the southern part of Logan is connected by North South roads that also create social and economic interests.

The electoral act states that these must be considered and it is important to understand that at least in the south of Logan City the social and economic interests 46(1)(a) clearly follow the 46(1)(b) ways of communication and travel on the major road corridors. By reconsidering this then the Redistribution Commission can better follow that they also must consider 46(1)(d) the

boundaries of the existing division of Logan, and indeed the divisions of Algester and Waterford. Finally 46(1)(e) requires the commission to consider the demographic trends and the proposal put forward by the ALP regarding these areas of Logan also takes these into due consideration.

The Queensland Redistribution Commission and concordance with the Queensland Electoral Act

Has the Commission met the requirement of the Act?

46 Matters to be considered in preparing proposed electoral redistribution

(1) In preparing the proposed redistribution, the commission must consider the following matters—

(a) the extent to which there is a community of economic, social, regional or other interests within each proposed electoral district;

(b) the ways of communication and travel within each proposed electoral district;

(c) the physical features of each proposed electoral district;

(d) the boundaries of existing electoral districts;

(e) demographic trends in the State, with a view to ensuring as far as practicable that, on the basis of the trends, the need for another electoral redistribution will not arise under section 39 before it does under section 38.

(2) The commission may also consider the boundaries of local government areas to the extent that it is satisfied that there is a community of economic, social, regional or other interests within each local government area.

(3) The commission may give such weight to each of the matters set out in subsections (1) and (2) as it considers appropriate.

In addition Section 44 outlines the requirement for seats to have names.

44 Preparing proposed electoral redistribution

(1) As soon as practicable after the 21 days mentioned in section 43(2)(b), the commission must prepare a proposed redistribution of the State into electoral districts.

(2) The proposed redistribution must include proposed names for the proposed electoral districts.

(3) In preparing the proposed electoral redistribution, the commission must—

(a) take into account all suggestions and comments properly made under sections 42 and 43; and

(b) comply with the following sections—

(i) section 45;

(ii) section 46.

The Commission defined the principles of the redistribution in their statement in the draft redistribution.

Overarching Principles of the Commission

a. Boundary changes must result in a district's enrolment being within quota based on 29th August, 2016 enrolment data;

b. Projected district enrolment should be brought within the accepted tolerance of the quota, wherever possible, as at the 29th August, 2023;

c. Localities are to be held within a single electorate where practicable, thereby avoiding suburbs being split between one or multiple electorates;

d. In rural and remote areas, or parts of the State with widely dispersed enrolment, local council areas should be contained within a single State electorate if practicable. This is especially true for Queensland's larger districts; and

e. New or renamed districts are to be named in honour of persons who have made significant contributions to the State, or after notable features or landmarks within an electorate. Where features have been used, the Commission has preferred to select a well-recognised indigenous name for this feature.

In my opinion the Commission has met the requirements of the Act in Principles a), and d), and in the majority of seats has satisfied Principle b). The exceptions are the seats of Logan, Jordan and Ipswich.

In a number of cases the Commission does not appear to have taken into account s46.1(d), regarding existing electoral boundaries. This is at variance with previous redistributions, including the most recent one undertaken in 2008 where the Commission stated "The Commission appreciates, however, that it is natural for electors generally to prefer existing boundaries, and to prefer the representative whom they have come to know."

While the Commission is empowered to provide this requirement with a minimal weighting, it appears to have been entirely left out of the stated principles. This has led to situations where previously entire localities have been split, such as part of Rochedale South, previously entirely within Springwood, now being included in Waterford.

Has the Commission met the requirements for naming electorates?

While s44 (2) of the Act does require the Commission to prepare proposed names for the proposed electoral districts, the construction in Principle e) is at variance with previous redistributions.

Previously the seats of Dalrymple and Nicklin were named after historical figures, and it can be argued that Cook and Gregory took their names at arms-length through geographical features that were also named after historical figures.

This redistribution adds another 12 names – Bancroft, Bonney, Cooper, Hill, Jordan, Macalister, McConnel, McMaster, Miller, Oodgeroo, Theodore and Traegar.

The majority of submissions did not address electorate names, and of those that did the majority of suggestions were adjusted place names.

- Submission 3 from Mr Jeff Waddell suggested Bonney, Davis, Fysh, Irwin, Jordan, Mabo, Macalister, McMaster and Oodgeroo.
- Submission 26 from the Liberal National Party suggested a seat called Jagera which, while not named after a particular person, is not a seat named after a geographical feature.

The proposed names of Bancroft, Cooper, Hill, McConnel, Miller, Theodore and Traegar appear to have originated from internal suggestions by the Commission unprompted by s44 (3) a.

In some cases the proposal is suitable. In other cases they are the right name in the wrong electorate, in at least one instance the name is completely inappropriate and in a few cases there are more suitable names which should have been used.

I note that the Members of the 2008 Redistribution Commission amended the proposed name of McMaster to Dalrymple, and this Commission has proposed amending it back.

I urge the commission to keep existing place names for this redistribution, using previous place names for the four new seats and any seat which contains less than 50 percent of the electors from a previous seat.

The Commission should then work towards a set of principles and suggestions for names that can be discussed in the lead up to the next redistribution. As the Commission itself noted *“The commissioners are very much aware that its consultation has not been as comprehensive as they would wish. After consulting as widely as possible within the time available, the Commission has chosen Aboriginal names that it believes are appropriate for several electoral districts. The selections are mostly named after prominent landmarks or features located within the district. If there are some who are troubled by a choice made, there is, of course an opportunity for them to make their opposition known and to explain their concerns in the period allowed after publication of this proposal.”*

I discuss this further in my comments on place names, but I would urge the Commissioners to offer a statement on what they see is the principal purpose of electorate names.

Without appropriate guidelines a future Commission may change the names of all 93 electorates, impacting on the opportunity for future Commissions to amend names.

Areas where accelerated growth has been underestimated

In the following areas housing construction has made projections largely irrelevant. In most cases the bulk of construction will take place in the immediate short-term.

Areas where growth has not been corrected

There are some areas where growth, either positive or negative, has not been corrected over the life of the redistribution. While it is impossible for all seats in Queensland to have balanced growth, ideally over the course of the redistribution each seat should move towards the average enrolment. In some case of extreme positive or negative growth it is necessary for the starting position of an electorate to be at the edge of the quota. This ensures that over the course of the redistribution the majority of the electorates, excluding the weighted electorates, have votes of equal value.

In particular the following seats have identified growth issues.

- Algester starts at -2.67% and finishes at -8.11%;
- Clayfield starts at 7.38% and finishes at 7.17%;
- Condamine starts at 4.79% and finishes at 6.66%;
- Macalister starts at -6.70% and finishes at -7.65%;
- Oodgeroo starts at -6.47% and finishes at -7.99%; and
- Waterford starts at -3.58 and finishes at -8.46%.

Ideally these seats could be repaired by exchanging territory with adjoining seats.

There are also a number of seats which have extreme growth which will put them well over the projected quota deviation by the next redistribution. In some of these areas I believe that the projected growth has been underestimated, which will make the final over-quota amount much worse. While the allowance has been partially addressed by starting at the extreme minimum quota, in every case the totality of the growth area has been kept within the same electorate instead of sharing the growth between electorates and correcting it at the next redistribution.

These seats are

- Ipswich, which starts at -8.56% and finishes at 27.61%;
- Jordan, which starts at -7.22% and finishes at 15.75%; and
- Logan, which starts at -8.92% and finishes at 18.85%.

Comments on Electorate Names

Comments on naming process

There are some issues with the changes in naming convention. This decision wasn't foreshadowed in the original call for submissions, so most of the submissions dealt with boundary changes and the importance of place names. Consequently the draft redistribution has presented many new names.

While many of the new names in the draft redistribution are worthy contenders, there are problems with the lack of guidelines for naming and the triggers for changing the name of an electorate. There are also significant problems with naming seats that don't have an affinity with the area. As an example the proposed seat of Macalister, based on Eagleby and the previous seat of Albert, is named after a Member of Parliament who spent much of his working life in and around Ipswich.

I propose the following guidelines for seat nomenclature:

- I. Changes to names are triggered by significant and quantifiable shifts in electorates;
- II. Seats named after localities and geographic features have to be the major geographic and historical markers;
- III. Place names should not duplicate existing local or federal government place names, unless the state seat wholly contains the local government area;
- IV. Seat names should aim to remove directional components, such as South or Upper;
- V. As a general rule seats should not be named after a living person, unless there is significant merit. This reduces the possibility that actions later in life, or discovery of previous actions, may make that person unsuitable;
- VI. If it is named after a person their most significant achievement has to be in Queensland;
- VII. Seats can't be named after people who have served as a Federal member or Senator;
- VIII. Significant community ties must exist between the seat and the person or place it is named after;
- IX. Seats may only be named after those who have made an overwhelmingly positive contribution to Queensland and their local community.

Guidelines used by the Australian Electoral Commission for their electorate names are:

- Naming after persons - In the main, divisions should be named after deceased Australians who have rendered outstanding service to their country. When new divisions are created the names of former Prime Ministers should be considered.
- Federation Divisional names - Every effort should be made to retain the names of original federation divisions.
- Geographical names - Locality or place names should generally be avoided, but in certain areas the use of geographical features may be appropriate (e.g. Perth).
- Aboriginal names - Aboriginal names should be used where appropriate and as far as possible existing Aboriginal divisional names should be retained.
- The names of Commonwealth Divisions should not duplicate existing State Districts.
- Qualifying names may be used where appropriate (e.g. Melbourne Ports, Port Adelaide).
- Names of divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons.
- When two or more divisions are partially combined, as far as possible the name of the new division should be that of the old division which had the greatest number of electors within the new boundaries. However, where the socio-demographic nature of the division in question has changed significantly, this should override the numerical formula.

After the redistribution I suggest that the ECQ call for public submissions on future electorate names and build a "bank" of names that are pending consideration for future seat changes. This allows adequate discussion to take place before any electorates are changed.

Comments on proposed seat names

While I would prefer the names of seats to remain the same until further discussion has taken place, I wish to also formally comment on the names of seats proposed, names of seats that have remained the same, the suitability of seat names and the appropriateness or otherwise of names and electorates.

Bundamba	No change	Although this seat has undergone extensive boundary changes the majority of this has occurred in the newer developments in the seat at Springfield. Consequently there are few problems with continuing to recognise the historical part of Bundamba.
Cook	Deeral	Duplication of Council name. Recognition of first indigenous State Member of Parliament, Eric Deeral.
Coomera		Significant changes to boundaries offer an opportunity to rename.
D'Aguiar	Chapman	Acknowledges the removed Pine Rivers Shire and the unique position of Yvonne Chapman as both the first female leader of the council and its only mayor before amalgamation into Moreton Bay Regional Council. As the State Member for this area she was also the first female Minister in a Queensland government.
Greenslopes	No change	Name now reflects the seat with the addition of the remaining section of Greenslopes from the seat of South Brisbane.
Gregory	McMaster	Recognising the work of the founder of Qantas, McMaster replaces Gregory to more accurately reflect his community of interest. It also covers Longreach, home of the QANTAS Founders Museum.
Hill		While I support the naming of a seat after Professor Dorothy Hill, I do not believe that there is a significant connection to the seat.
Hinchinbrook		Significant changes to the seat offer the opportunity of a name change.
Ipswich	Macalister	Arthur Macalister's entire professional connection to Queensland was based at Ipswich, so there does not seem to be any connection with the seat currently proposed as Macalister. Renaming the seat of Ipswich is justified by the precedent of renaming the seat of Brisbane to McConnell. It also removes the duplication in names with the Ipswich City Council.
Ipswich West	Rename to Jordan	Removes a directional name and more appropriately locates the seat in the area covered by the person it was named for. See Jordan.

Electorate	Name	Comments
Jordan	Rename to Springfield	As detailed in the submission from Shayne Neumann MP, the seat of Jordan is improperly named. As the core of this new seat is contained within Springfield, this is an obvious name for the new seat. As the Federal seat of Longman is named after Queensland's first female State Member, it is appropriate to name a seat after Queensland's second female State Member.
Kurwongbah	Pine Rivers	Kurwongbah was a short lived seat. The name Pine Rivers acknowledges the former Pine Rivers Council.
Logan		Duplicates Local Government name.
MacAlister		Arthur MacAlister's entire professional connection to Queensland was based out of Ipswich, so there does not seem to be any connection with the seat currently proposed. I suggest replacing Ipswich with MacAlister to better reflect his connection to the seat.
Maiwar	Maiwar OR Ithaca	Maiwar is a suitable name, but I would also like the Commission to consider the old name of Ithaca, which continues on in the Ithaca Fire station and Ithaca Iceworks. The Ithaca Town Council was one of the original councils that merged into Brisbane City Council in 1925.
McConnel	Miller	Although there are only minor boundary changes, I support renaming this seat to avoid confusion with the Federal and Local Government electoral boundaries. I believe that the seat is misnamed, and should instead be called Miller to acknowledge the location of Emma Miller Place in Roma Street, Brisbane.
McMaster	Burdekin	Burdekin is a significant historical local government name, like Pine Rivers and Albert, that has no remaining recognition.
Miller	Byrnes	Due to relevance, moved from the proposed location to instead replace McConnel at Brisbane Central. I suggest naming it after Thomas Joseph Byrnes, who was the Queensland representative at meetings of the Federal Council in 1895 and 1897. He became Premier of Queensland in 1898 and died after five months. There is a significant statue in Warwick dedicated to his memory which was raised from public funds, and another at Centenary Place in Fortitude Valley.
Mulgrave	No change	While there are significant boundary changes, I believe that the name has a significant historical basis.
Murrumba		The changes to Murrumba are so significant I believe that a new name is required.

Comments on boundaries

Gold Coast Area

I am in broad agreement with the Commission on the proposed boundaries. In general the Gold Coast seats will grow at the same rate. However I am concerned at the obviously low consideration given to the Pacific Highway as a natural road boundary and the missed opportunity to realign the existing electorates east and west of the Highway.

The Area between Brisbane and the Gold Coast

Logan

The seat of Logan and the loss of Marsden and the urban housing area to Woodridge result in a far stronger area based on shared interests. However the inclusion of both Yarrabilba and Flagstone increases the likely population increase. Where possible this growth should have been shared between neighbouring electorates.

Macalister

The inclusion of Beenleigh, Eagleby and Mt Warren Park in the same electorate is a sensible proposal. However the addition of the area of Cornubia and Carbrook north of the Logan River is not. While this may be a short-term fix for the area, it obviously goes against the guidelines on natural and existing electoral boundaries. Over the long term this is not a sustainable solution.

Waterford

The extension of the Waterford electorate to include Underwood and part of Rochedale South does not appear to be a sensible proposal. If this area must be split, it makes more sense to add it to Woodridge and transfer some of the southern section of Woodridge at Crestmead to Waterford. Under the proposal residents from Rochedale South would almost drive past the Woodridge electorate office to get to the Waterford electorate office.

South of the Brisbane River Area

Due to the relative population decline in some Brisbane South electorates, there is a need for some fairly major changes.

Note on Brisbane Technology Park

The area covered by the Technology Park (SAI 3106032) lies at the corner of Toohey, Stretton and Mansfield. There are no electors living in this area and therefore it does not have any effect on the electoral quotas. However it is a significant employer and has links to both public and private transport nodes. I believe the QRC should assess this major development and where it should be placed, in much the same way it has assessed education, medical and other major infrastructure.

Mansfield/Greenslopes

The QRC proposal for the electorate of Mansfield has severely underestimated the population growth for the Rochedale subdivision and the timeframe for completion. One SAI (3106410) already exceeds the projected enrolment for 2022.

Mansfield is estimated to be 2.04% under quota at the start of this process and drop to 5.13% under at the time of the next redistribution. While the growth in Rochedale will not be as extreme as other new housing areas, I believe that a cautious approach would start with Mansfield slightly higher under quota.

To achieve this with minimal impact I propose adding the section bounded by the M1, Nursery Road and Logan Road, and the adjoining area bounded by Nursery Road, Bapaume Road, Dagmar Street, Odessa Street,

Hockings Street and Logan Road from Greenslopes to Mansfield, and retaining the area of Mt Gravatt East bounded by Logan Road, Nursery Road, Creek Road and Cavendish Road in Greenslopes.

The changes are as follows

However Mansfield has been placed at the edge of the redistribution tolerance to take account of the growth in the Rochedale area, much of which will be completed before the next redistribution.

This also provides some room for Greenslopes to be adjusted pending further growth in South Brisbane, Bulimba or Chatsworth.

Stretton/Toohey

While the majority of changes to the electorate of Stretton are practical, I have some concerns with the shift of electors between Stretton and Toohey. While the transfer of electors from Stretton to Toohey is acknowledged in the Toohey summary, it is unfortunately absent from the Stretton summary. Toohey has 32,905 electors, which is 0.79% below quota, and is predicted to have 33,850 electors by 2023 which would be 8.17% below quota. Stretton has 33,001 electors, which is 0.05% below quota, and is predicted to have 34,132 electors by 2023 which would be 7.4% below quota.

Section 46 of the Queensland Electoral Act provides guidelines to be considered by the Commission, including d) The boundaries of existing electoral districts. There has not been sufficient weighting given to this guideline at the boundary at Eight Mile Plains where an area has been transferred to Stretton from Toohey (The area bounded by Logan Road, Warrigal Road, Underwood Road and Padstow Roads, containing SAI 30303106032, 30303106021, 30303106023, 30303106025, 30303106024, 30303106008, 30303106001, 30303106005, 30303106004, 30303106002 and 30303106003) and an adjoining area has been transferred from Toohey to Stretton (the area bounded by Warrigal Road, Daw Road, Bonemill Road and Beenleigh Road containing SAI 30306107828, 30306107827, 30306107818, 30306107826, 30306107829, 30306107830, 30306107825 and part of 30306107824).

A section of Acacia Ridge and Sunnybank Hills at the north-west boundary has also been transferred (the area bounded by the Interstate Rail line, Jackson Road, Beenleigh Road, Beaudesert Road and Hellawell Road containing SAI 30305107625, 30306108023, 30306108006, 30306108010, 30306108009 and 30306108011).

Taking it back to the original electorate boundaries would result in a net transfer of electors from Stretton to Toohey of 167 on current enrolment, with a projected change of 179 to 2022. This would result in Toohey with 33,082 electors, which is 0.25 % below quota, and is predicted to have 33,671 electors by 2023 which would be 8.65% below quota. Stretton has 32,834 electors, which is 1.00% below quota, and is predicted to have 34,311 electors by 2023 which would be 6.91 % below quota.

Mount Ommaney/Inala/Miller

Mount Ommaney has a significant border with the Brisbane River and Ipswich Road. I propose that the seat should remain fully within that area.

The proposed electorate of Mount Ommaney has 34,285 electors, which is 3.37% above quota, and is predicted to have 35,193 electors by 2023 which would be 4.52% below quota. The proposed electorate of Inala has 32,809 electors, which is 1.08% below quota, and is predicted to have 37,322 electors by 2023 which would be 1.25% above quota. The proposed electorate of Miller has 33,186 electors, which is 0.06% above quota, and is predicted to have 34,238 electors by 2023 which would be 7.11% below quota.

There is minimal scope for further residential development in Mount Ommaney or Inala. There is ongoing development in Miller along Ipswich Road at Moorooka and within the Fairfield and Annerley areas. I believe that a projected growth of 1,052 electors in Miller is at the extreme lower growth forecast.

For this reason I believe that Inala and Mount Ommaney should have their electors increased, while positioning Miller at the outer end of current projected growth. I also believe that there is adequate potential for Miller to add additional growth at the border with South Brisbane.

I propose that the area west of the Centenary Highway (SAI 3127110) should remain with Inala, as the Highway forms a natural barrier and it is adjacent to the parts of Inala north of Ipswich Road. This will add a minimal 236 current and 234 future electors to the seat of Inala.

As the railway line forms a more impermeable barrier than Oxley Road, I propose that the area west of the railway line at Corinda and including part of Sherwood (SAI 3109502, 3109503, 3109504, 3109505 and 3109506) should be added to Mount Ommaney. To provide balance to the seat of Miller the areas of Sherwood currently east of the railway line (SAI 3109501, 3109301, 3109312 and 3109304) should be added to Miller.

Within a relatively short number of redistributions the low growth in Mount Ommaney will encourage the seat to expand by adding the entirety of Graceville, Chelmer and Sherwood.

The Ipswich Area

Due to the high growth in the Ipswich basin it is very difficult to devise a scenario that meets the requirements of the Act. However I suggest some thought should be given to retaining some of the high growth area around Ripley in the seat of Lockyer to act as a pressure release. It is likely, given the projected growth rates, that another seat will be formed in the Ipswich region at the next redistribution. In that case the most important factor is maintaining the relative weight of votes over the course of this redistribution.

Southern Queensland

The five seats that make up this area have steady, minimal growth and except for the previous suggestion regarding Lockyer I have no further observations.

North of the Brisbane River Area

Most of the seats have been adjusted well to account for demographic changes. The only suggestion I would make concerns the electorates of Nudgee and Clayfield. Clayfield is currently over quota by 7.38% and is projected to maintain this over quota amount for the duration of this redistribution, dropping by 0.21%. Nudgee is currently 5.5% over and is projected to drop to 1.68% under. It would be more equitable to transfer some of Clayfield along the boundary to Nudgee.

The Area between Brisbane and the Sunshine Coast

Pumicestone/Murrumba/Bancroft/Kurwongbah/Morayfield/D'Aguilar

I do not believe that the redistribution as proposed for this area is well done. However I am also aware that significant change at this stage is unlikely.

My principal objections are:-

- The Bruce Highway is crossed by the proposed electorates of Murrumba, Bancroft and Pumicestone. Ideally the seat changes could have been achieved with only one crossing.
- While Pumicestone now contains the entirety of Bribie Island, it still has a section of Caboolture in it. There is no community of interest between these two areas with widely varying demographics.
- The regional centre of Caboolture is split, despite the Caboolture River and the Bruce Highway providing a natural boundary

Ideally the construction of the new seats would have started in the north, with Pumicestone staying on the Eastern Side of the Bruce Highway, covering all of Bribie Island and continuing through Burpengary East until it had met a quota. At the same time Morayfield could have started on the Western Side of the Bruce Highway, taking in all of Caboolture until it met a quota north of the rural area of Burpengary.

This would have allowed Bancroft to lose the area west of the Bruce Highway at Kallangur and instead gain the section of Rothwell north of Anzac Avenue from Murrumba, giving it a contiguous border with Redcliffe.

Kurwongbah would have gained the southern rural section from Morayfield and the area between Old Gympie Road and the Bruce Highway from Bancroft.

This would have allowed Murrumba to pivot across the Highway, making future adjustments in other seats easier.

The Sunshine Coast Area

The addition of the new seat of Ninderry allows adjustments to many of the growth areas of the northern Sunshine Coast. Importantly, the very distinct seat of Noosa now is contained mostly within the Local Government Area and is reflective of the electors desire to remain within one area.

The two high growth areas of Maroochydore Town Centre and Caloundra South will have different outcomes – one being a repurposing of an existing area and the other being a completely new greenfields development.

Caloundra/Tibrogargan

I do not believe that the impact of the development of Caloundra South (Aura) has been properly taken into account. As the majority of this area falls into one SAI (3142009) the over quota expansion is likely to impact before the next redistribution.

Tibrogargan has a much smaller projected growth allowing areas to be moved at the edges of the Caloundra electorate without unduly affecting Tibrogargan.

It has a number of other benefits:

- Allowing the Bruce Highway to be used as a boundary;
- Removing the double transfer between both electorates at Landsborough and minimising changes to existing electorate boundaries;
- Addresses the community of interest considerations between the two electorates.
- The entire length of Steve Irwin Way is then within the electorate, providing for an obvious change of name.

I therefore propose the following changes:

The area east of the Bruce Highway bounded by Coochin Creek, Pumicestone Channel, Glasshouse Creek and the Bruce Highway (SAI 3144103) be moved from Tibrogargan to Caloundra.

That the area of the Caloundra electorate west of the Bruce Highway, bounded by the Bruce Highway, the proposed boundary with Tibrogargan west of the Bruce Highway, Sippy Creek Road, the Palmview locality boundary, the Glenview locality boundary and the Landsborough locality boundary, be moved from Caloundra to Tibrogargan. This places the whole of Landsborough, Beerwah and Glenview with the electorate of Tibrogargan.

Projected growth for Tibrogargan is 4.4 percent below quota now, rising to 2.91 percent below quota at the next redistribution. Caloundra is projected to be 4.65 percent below quota now, growing to 8.95 percent over quota by 2023. The Commission notes that this will “cater for future growth expected in this area”.

The future growth is happening now and Sunshine Coast Regional Council approvals project a further 20,000 households with an additional 50,000 people by 2030. I suggest that Caloundra should be closer to 8.95 percent under now to put projected growth in the safe zone at 4.65 over by the next redistribution, allowing for unexpected growth. Adding a safety margin of 4.3 percent from Caloundra to Tibrogargan changes the numbers to 0.1 percent under quota now to 2.61 percent over in 2023, a far more manageable number.

Wide Bay and Burnett Area

I believe that the recommendations for Wide Bay and Burnett are suitable.

Central Queensland

Given the boom and bust nature of this area I believe the recommendations are as good as they can be.

Northern Queensland

The significant development around Mount Peter underscores the projected growth in Mulgrave and Barron River, and the creation of the new seat of Hill from the area of Barron River was in line with my original submission.

While Cairns and Townsville have received attention, there are still issues with Mackay, Whitsunday and McMaster. At the next redistribution I suggest that the QRC look at overcoming these particular problems:

- Electoral boundaries cross LGA areas;
- The seat of Whitsunday is a dumbbell-shaped seat, with most of the population at either end;
- Many communities that share a common interest are split.

I suggest that there is a future opportunity to look at a South Mackay seat encompassing Sarina, and a North Mackay seat that covers the central area of Mackay to the Mackay Regional Council border in the north. This would allow a seat to be created entirely within the Whitsunday Regional Council area to the coastal Burdekin area, and a Mirani that included the mining regions around Dysart and a significant proportion of the current south-western area of McMaster.

Electoral Districts above 100,000 km² in area

These four electorates are difficult to assess, as the objectives for the seats differ from the remaining 89 seats. While there is a desire to minimise the number of seats that fall under this category, there is also the risk that the seats may become unserviceable. I suggest that the QRC should base these electorates on a major population centre (bearing in mind major does not mean the same thing as it does on the Eastern seaboard) and develop seats that have consistent centres. I suggest Weipa, Mount Isa, Longreach and Charleville would be suitable regional centres, and potentially adding Goondiwindi, Hughenden, Emerald or Cooktown to provide greater representation.

The Secretary, QLD Redistribution Commission, As an elected representative of Rainbow Beach and the broader Cooloola Coast, as Division 1 Councillor, for the Gympie Regional Council I need to submit a response with respect to the Boundary Redistribution. The concerns that I and the communities I represent are real and extremely worrying. * Noosa and Rainbow Beach are Geographically divided by Womalah, Toolara, and Ringtail Forests. Further by Cooloola Conservation Reserve and The Great Sandy National Park. These combined with the vast 4WD only expanse of beach provide imposing land blocks between these two centres. I firmly believe this is a reason alone for review as access to Gympie as opposed to the proposed electorate office of Noosa is made significantly more difficult. We have many at Rainbow who like to be able to meet with their Local Member. *It follows then, and was highlighted at a Public Meeting held at Rainbow Beach on March 9 that the community had a great sense of belonging and ownership within the Gympie Electorate. *I respectfully submit that the Population Demographic between the two communities are light years apart. The Rainbow community genuinely fear the Noosa influence. *The Cooloola Coast is popularly known as 'The Jewel in the Crown' of the Gympie Region. Figuratively and Psychologically this Boundary Realignment will have a major impact on the Cooloola Coast and the Gympie Region. The Political Discussion over what is best for our Coast will have vastly different tenor if our small, remote coastal stretch is driven by two vastly different ideologies. I write with respect to the Queensland Redistribution Commission's ("the Commission") proposal for the redistribution of the State's electoral boundaries ("the Proposal").

I will limit my comments to the Proposal so far as it relates to the Kawana electorate ("Kawana").

I have had the honour of representing the residents of Kawana since early 2009. In that time I have developed a thorough knowledge of what makes, in essence, Kawana, its people and community tick.

Although recognising the Commission's difficult task of redistributing the boundaries pursuant to the laws of Queensland, I do feel that the proposed Kawana boundary will have far reaching and negative impacts on our local community both socially and economically.

Having regard to section 46 (1) of the Electoral Act 1992, it is my view that the Commission in drafting the Proposal has not placed strong enough emphasis on Kawana's community of economic, social and regional interest.

I would note that the suburb of Buddina is incorrectly referenced in the Proposal as Buddin. Accordingly, please amend future references to Buddina.

HISTORY OF KAWANA WATERS

The name Kawana is an indigenous name meaning 'wildflower' and was used by Mr Alfred Grant, an early developer, who in 1959 chose to use the name Kawana in recognition of the abundance of wildflowers in the area.

Mr Grant had originally planned to develop the area as Kawana Island. This was based on the original concept that the Mooloolah River would be connected to the Currimundi Creek.

Ultimately this plan did not eventuate.

From the 1960's Kawana developed into what is now commonly known as Kawana Waters.

Interestingly throughout this time, although developers and developments have changed, the area known as 'Kawana Waters', between the Mooloolah River and Currimundi Creek (now Currimundi Lake), has not.

When locals refer to the Kawana Waters area, it is generally known as the area north of Currmundi Lake and south of the Mooloolah River. I have **enclosed** a copy of the signage located on Nicklin Way on the northern end and southern end of Kawana Waters to show the geographic signage for locals and visitors.

Prior to the amalgamation of the Caloundra, Maroochy and Noosa Councils into the Sunshine Coast Council, the Kawana Waters area fell wholly into the Caloundra City Council boundary. The Mooloolah River was the natural boundary between the Caloundra and Maroochy Shires.

The balance of the Kawana electorate with one exception is contained in the former Caloundra City Council boundary. The exception being Sippy Downs, which was in the former Maroochy Shire Council area sharing the same postcode as Buderim.

This is important as the Caloundra City Council, formerly the Landsborough Shire Council, was instrumental behind the approvals and planning for the modern day Kawana Waters' community.

KAWANA COMMUNITY & LIFESTYLE

The electorate of Kawana is predominantly a coastal urban electorate. Residents enjoy the benefits of white sand beaches stretching from Point Cartwright in the north to Currmundi in the south.

Buderim falls between the centres of Maroochydore and Nambour, and is best described as a leafy green electorate incorporating lush rainforest and semi-rural regions.

There is no connection between the coastal urban suburbs of Minyama, Buddina and Parrearra and the Buderim electorate.

These coastal-based urban communities are culturally and socially connected with Kawana.

COMMUNITY ORGANISATIONS

Kawana is well represented by many fantastic community organisations with thousands of volunteers participating and volunteering in our community each day.

The following Kawana community organisations are currently headquartered in the northern end of the electorate. If the Proposal is finalised these Kawana community organisations will fall within the Buderim Electorate:-

Kawana Waters RSL Sub Branch;
Kawana Waters Surf Lifesaving Club;
Kawana Scouts;
Kawana Library;
Kawana Rotary;
Kawana Seniors;
Kawana Companions; and
Lions Club of Lake Currmundi-Kawana.

Further, the Kawana Community Centre located at Nanyima Street, Buddina also contains the Kawana Library and is a central meeting place and community hub. It is also located next to the Kawana Shoppingworld and Buddina State School.

Community members do appreciate convenient access to their local Member of Parliament.

Many of the volunteers are senior citizens of our community. Some do not drive and do rely on easy access to their Member and his or her office for assistance.

It is my experience that the majority of Members of Parliament often carry out various tasks to assist local community organisations including photocopying of minutes of meetings, flyers and notices, and on occasion allow the organisations to utilize the office space for their meetings.

If the Proposal is finalised, these volunteers will be forced to drive to the top of Buderim where the current Buderim electorate office is located. This in a vehicle would take approximately 30 minutes and by public transport a fair amount more time.

Community organisations often call on their Member at the electorate office to discuss available grants and to update the Member on the organisation and its activities.

I believe that if the Proposal is finalised then the heart of the Kawana community will be taken out of Kawana.

We will have a disconnection of community organisations. For instance, the abovementioned community organisations will now fall within the Buderim Electorate, yet the following organisations will be retained in the Kawana electorate:-

Kawana Waters Fire Station;
Kawana Waters State College;
Kawana Police Station;
Lake Kawana Community Centre; and
Kawana Bowls Club.

BUSINESS

The Kawana electorate has a mix of retail, commercial and manufacturing businesses.

The Kawana Waters Chamber of Commerce is the business representative body in the electorate.

I note that the Kawana Chamber has provided a submission to the Commission against the Proposal on the basis that, like the residents and community organisations, there is a natural business and economical connection along the coastal stretch of Kawana Waters.

SHOPPING DISTRICT AND PUBLIC TRANSPORT

The most significant shopping centre in the local community is Kawana Shoppingworld. This important community centre comprises 166 shops including Big W, Coles, Woolworths and Aldi, and also acts as a major transportation hub which directly links bus services to the Sunshine Coast University Hospital as well as other bus routes operating throughout the Kawana electorate.

The shopping centre has experienced growth in the past few years leading Mirvac to start a redevelopment of the site to include cinemas.

When the redevelopment is completed with cinemas and additional specialty shops, the shopping centre will be utilized and recognised - even more than it is at the moment - as a community hub for Kawana.

With population growth comes public transportation challenges.

It is important to have a local Member of Parliament that understands the area and its challenges, particularly with respect to public transportation.

The Sunshine Coast Council is currently preparing a business case for light rail that will directly impact on Kawana Waters residents and businesses. The preliminary plans for the light rail show the corridor as running down Nicklin Way with connections to the new Sunshine Coast University Hospital.

As I indicated earlier, I have represented the Kawana Waters area for eight years. In my experience, discussions about public transport in this area, including planning, always involve the question of 'how to connect the southern and northern residents of the electorate to community facilities, including the Kawana Shoppingworld and the new Sunshine Coast University Hospital.'

The current northern alignment of the electorate satisfies section 46 (1) (b) of the Electoral Act in terms of travel within the electorate.

RESIDENTS

Kawana's population has rapidly grown over the years. Residents certainly do have an affinity with our local area. Most residents living in Buddina, Minyama and Parrearra shop locally and socialise locally, and are represented by wonderful community organisations and sporting clubs.

I note that if the Proposal is finalised, one retirement village (Living Choice) and three over 50's living (Island Point Villas, Kawana Island Villas and the Groves) will fall into the Buderim electorate. Unfortunately, that will mean many hundreds of senior residents will not have convenient access to the local Member of Parliament, as is the case now.

It would be a shame to break the existing social and economic nexus that exists in the Kawana Waters area.

SPORT

Located in Kawana Waters is the Sunshine Coast Stadium & Kawana Sports Precinct.

The stadium and precinct is home to local sporting clubs including:-

- Brothers Junior Rugby Union;
- Club Kawana Radio Yacht Club;
- Kawana Junior Rugby League;
- Kawana Senior Rugby League;
- Kawana Soccer Club;
- Kawana Touch Association;

- Sunshine Coast Churches Soccer Association;
- Sunshine Coast Falcons; and
- Sunshine Coast FC (Fire).

Although the Kawana Sports Precinct will still be located in the Kawana electorate, many of the volunteers and players are based in the areas of Minyama, Buddina and Parrearra.

The same situation arises here with respect to the splitting of the community.

Many of the sporting organisations, as is the case with community organisations, attract their membership base from the general Kawana Waters area.

ELECTORATE OFFICE

Under the Proposal, the existing Kawana electorate office will not be located in the Kawana electorate. It would be located in the Buderim electorate.

Although not an insurmountable problem it does come with difficulties, particularly costs to the taxpayer and the distance from Buddina, Minyama and Parrearra.

I believe, as a first principle, that electorate offices should be located in the electorate to which they service.

Accordingly, if the Proposal is finalised the Kawana electorate office should be moved into the new Kawana electorate.

I believe the Commission should take into consideration the cost to the taxpayer in moving an electorate office.

Some may argue that the office can remain where it is, on Nicklin Way. This is challenging in that if the Proposal is finalised, residents of the northern section of Kawana Waters would drive past the Kawana electorate office to visit their Member for Buderim, on top of Buderim.

ELECTORATE NAME

I note that the name 'Kawana' is a designated suburb located near Rockhampton.

I would suggest that the Commission give consideration to adding the word 'Waters' after 'Kawana' to truly reflect the current communities. The electorate could be named 'Kawana Waters'.

CONCLUSION

After travelling around my electorate over the past 30 days and speaking to many people about the Proposal, I am yet to find anyone that endorses or supports the Proposal to transfer the suburbs of Minyama, Buddina and Parrearra into the Buderim electorate for the reasons that I have outlined above.

Accordingly, I ask you to reconsider the Proposal, placing more emphasis on Kawana's strong economic, social and regional communities of interest as required under section 46 (1) of the

Electoral Act 1992. For the Kawana electorate to truly reflect those community connections, the suburbs of Buddina, Minyama and Parrearra should be included in the final Kawana electorate determination.

Please keep Kawana in Kawana.

I wish to make a submission on the recent redistribution of State Electoral Boundaries. My submission goes to the naming of electorates

I am an elector in the electorate of Indooroopilly and a former Queensland Senator with a long interest in electoral reform.

Naming of Electorates

I appreciate the difficulty that the Committee has had in naming electorates. However, I believe that the Committee will do a serious disservice to the people of Queensland if it moves away from electorates with geographical or locality names. Giving an electorate a name that clearly identifies it with a particular area helps to make the electorate and its representative clearly identifiable both to its residents and to other people in Queensland. Hence, if I hear the media refer to the 'Member for Indooroopilly', a well known suburb in Brisbane, it would be immediately apparent that the member represents western Brisbane. If the media referred to the 'Member for Maiwar', no one would have any idea where this seat is. Naming seats after prominent (and in some suggested cases not very prominent) former Queenslanders creates the same difficulty. As Professor John Warhurst noted in a discussion about changing names of ACT electorates recently:

"In the case of the naming of electorates there are also very good alternatives which may be squeezed out by the use of individual name. The first are geographical names, even if they themselves have been named after individuals in the dim distant past. It would be a shame to lose names like Eden-Monaro, Melbourne Ports, Riverina, Mallee and Hume even if they are replaced by the name of a former prime minister. One advantage of geographical names is that they have somewhat greater name recognition and people might even be able to guess where they come from. One possibility for the ACT electorates would be just Canberra North and Canberra South."¹

A quick survey of English speaking countries relying on the Westminster tradition shows that geographic names are the preferred means of naming electorates:

- The United Kingdom, the Republic of Ireland, New Zealand and Canada use geographic names to describe electorates;
- Australia at a Federal level started using geographic names, and continues to use the original electorate names where possible. But, since 1949, has used names of Prime Ministers and other prominent figures;

- The states of Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria and Western Australia use geographic names (South Australia is the exception).

My concern is that moving away from geographic names will be a further break in the relationship between electors and their elected representatives. By not knowing what electorate they are in (and by other electors not knowing where the elected representative actually represents), it will further erode that relationship. This should be of serious concern to the Committee. The Constitutional Values Survey from Griffith University found that the % of people who felt that democracy was working well in Australia has declined from 80.8% in 2008 to 69.4% in 2014. The survey found that voters had a higher level of confidence in local government (58.9%) compared with State (54.5%) or Federal government (52.5%). Queensland recorded one of the highest levels of confidence in local government (62.7%) and the lowest in State government (44.5%).² Another study by the Governance and Policy Analysis Institute asked the question differently, and found voters were more likely to trust their 'local MP' (33%) than 'MPs in general' (26%), 'Government Ministers (25%) or 'local councillors' (30%).³ This highlights the importance of MPs being seen to be local. The Australian Elections Study has found that the overall level of satisfaction with Australian Democracy has dropped from 82-86% (2004-7) to 60% (2013).⁴ A survey of British voters by the Handard Society in 2015 found just 22 Per cent of voters could name their local MP, down from 38% in 2011.⁵ Research by EMC found that voters were more likely to trust their local councillor (38%) than their State MP (31%) or Federal MP (30%)⁶.

A second concern is that when an electorate changes its name, it 'loses' its history. Thus, the seat of Ashgrove, since 1960, has been represented by a Premier, a Speaker, three State Ministers and a former Test Cricketer, all recorded on Wikipedia⁷ and other sources. If the seat is renamed, it no longer has that history. The Commonwealth guidelines for Federal electorate names recognise the importance of historical names by stating that 'every effort be made to retain the names of original Federation divisions'.⁸ Guidelines for naming electorates should include a criteria:

- 'That every effort should be made to retain the names of long used electorate names to connect to the democratic history of Queensland';
- That the use of geographic features might be more appropriate than locality names, although prominent localities (e.g. significant commercial or regional centres) might be appropriate to help both residents and non-residents to identify the electorate;
- That Aboriginal names should be used where appropriate and, as far as possible, the names of existing divisions with Aboriginal names should be retained.

- That the names of State divisions should not duplicate existing Commonwealth divisions and discussions between the Commonwealth and State Electoral Officers should take place on this question.
- That qualifying names (e.g. Toowoomba North, Brisbane Central) should be used where appropriate.
- That names of divisions should not be changed or transferred to new areas without very strong reasons.
- That, when two or more divisions are partially combined at a redistribution, as far as possible the name of the new division should be that of the old division which has the greatest number of electors within the new boundaries.

Attached to this submission is a table including the history of names of electorates over the past century. It is strongly recommended, consistent with the above suggested principles, that the names that have been used since at least 1960 continue to be used wherever possible. On that basis, I would suggest that the following name changes be reversed.

Proposed Name	Current name	Recommended name
Bancroft	new	Deception Bay. This is a prominent geographic feature and the largest suburb in the electorate.
Bonney	new	Labrador or Broadwater. Labrador is the largest suburb in the electorate. An alternative approach could be to name this seat Broadwater (much of the current seat is in it), which would allow the division to the north to take the name of Coombabah, a prominent lake, suburb, and indigenous name.
Cooper	Ashgrove	Ashgrove or Ithaca. Ashgrove has been a seat since 1960, represented by a Premier, a Speaker, three Ministers and a test cricketer. Most of the old seat is in this seat, including the commercial heart of Ashgrove (although the northern part of the suburb has been shifted to Ferny Grove). The name should be retained. If a new name is sought, I would suggest Ithaca, which was a division from 1912 until 1986. Its sitting members included Labor Premier Ned Hanlon, and later his son Pat. Ithaca Creek flows through the electorate, and it is the name of a school.
D'Aguilar	Pine Rivers	Pine Rivers. There is no good reason to change the name of this electorate – the entire seat includes the catchment of the North and South Pine Rivers and it is the locally known name for the region. Pine Rivers was a seat from 1972-92 (then renamed Kurwongbah) and from 2009. Its history includes representation by Queensland's first female Minister Yvonne Chapman.
Hill	new	Mourilyan or Johnstone. Hill is a rather ironic name that includes Queensland's highest mountain and the Atherton Tablelands. The seat looks very similar to the former seat of Mourilyan when it was abolished in 1992 (it existed from 1950-92). Mourilyan Harbour is a volcanic crater located in the electorate. An alternative name could be Johnstone, as the Johnstone River rises in the Tablelands and flows close to Malanda and Millaa Millaa and own the range to

		Innisfail and the coast.
Jordan	new	Springfield. Springfield is the principal locality and increasingly a regional name for the satellite city that dominates this seat.
Kurwongbah	Kallangur	Kurwongbah
Macalister	Albert	Albert or Beenleigh. The seat of Albert has existed since 1888 (it was renamed Darlington from 1950-60), and has been represented by three State ministers. The town of Beenleigh has been the centre of that seat for most of that time. As the Albert River forms the eastern boundary for the seat, the name should be retained. An alternative name could be Beenleigh, which is a significant regional centre at the heart of the electorate.
McConnel	Brisbane Central	Brisbane Central. There has been a seat of Brisbane since 1859, named Brisbane (1912-1977) and Brisbane Central since. Its former members include a Premier and a Speaker.
McMaster	Burdekin	Burdekin. The seat of Burdekin was created in 1950, and has been represented by two Ministers. Most of the seat (including much of the area west of Clermont and Moranbah) is in the catchment of the Burdekin River.
Maiwar	Mt Coot-tha	Mt Coothta. The seat of Mt Coot-tha has existed since 1950 and has been represented by a Deputy Premier, a Treasurer and two other Ministers since then. Much of the current seat of Mt Coothta and the prominent landmark of that name is included in this seat. It makes sense to maintain the name of this long established western suburbs seat.
Miller	Yeerongpilly	Yeerongpilly. The seat of Yeronga existed from 1950-2001 when it was renamed Yeerongpilly. This is an indigenous name and a significant locality, with the State Tennis Centre and a railway station of that name. There is no good reason to rename the seat.
Ninderry	new	Ninderry or Maroochy River. While Ninderry is a locality name in this seat, a better name might be Maroochy River, which is the dominant geographic feature of the seat.
Oodgeroo	Cleveland	Cleveland. Cleveland was created in 1992 and is the name of the major regional centre in Redland City. There is no good reason to rename the seat.
Scenic Rim	Beaudesert	Scenic Rim
Theodore	new	Oxenford. Edward Theodore is a name more associated with North Queensland than the Gold Coast. As Oxenford is a significant locality in the middle of the electorate located at the main crossing of the Coomera River, it would be a very strong name for the new seat.
Tibrogargan	Glasshouse	Glasshouse. Glasshouse was created in 1986, and is a better known regional name than Tibrogargan. There is no good reason to change the name of the electorate.
Toohy	Sunnybank	Sunnybank. Sunnybank is a major suburb and commercial centre in the geographic centre of this electorate. There is no good reason to change the seat to Toohy, which is a forest park on the northern border of the electorate.

Traeger	Mt Isa	Mt Isa, Flinders or Carpentaria. Mt Isa was created in 1972 and has been represented by two State Ministers since then. Mt Isa is the largest regional centre and should be retained. An alternative name could be Flinders, which existed as a seat from 1888-1932 and from 1950-1992, when it was renamed Charters Towers. Finders River is the largest River in the seat and also the name of the highway that connects Mt Isa to Townsville.
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There are many more appropriate ways to honour prominent former Queenslanders without doing irreparable damage to Queensland's democracy:

- Vi Jordan, as a former Ipswich councillor and Member, has a local park named after her;⁹
- Dorothy Hill, a ground breaking academic, has a library named after her at the University of Queensland;¹⁰
- Oodgeroo Noonuccal is commemorated in an Indigenous education unit at QUT¹¹ and a poetry award¹²;
- Edward Theodore has a town in central Queensland and a suburb in Canberra named after him;
- Arthur Macalister has a town named after him on the Darling Downs and a mountain range and national park in North Queensland;
- Mary McConnell, an educator, has a school of Early Education named after her;
- Fergus McMaster, a founder of Qantas, was honoured with the naming of an Airbus after him in 2008;¹³
- Emma Miller is commemorated with a statue in King George Square and a small park on Roma Street;
- Lilian Cooper, a doctor, is commemorated in the name of a women's health centre at Spring Hill¹⁴ and a nursing home at Kangaroo Point;¹⁵
- Alfred Traeger is commemorated with a park and a monument in Alice Springs¹⁶;
- Lores Bonney, aviatrix, is commemorated at Archerfield Airport (Lores Bonney Avenue) and at Miami (Lores Bonney Lookout), neither of which are in the proposed electorate;
- Joseph Bancroft, doctor and scientist, is commemorated in Bancroft Park at Deception Bay.

As the former member for Logan I take close interest in the work of the commission in performing such a difficult but essential job. However as the former member for Logan, I wish to make a suggestion that might be helpful in finalising the boundaries. When considering the southern parts of Logan City, I would ask the commission to consider utmost that communities are oriented with services and shopping in the suburban areas to the north and connected on road corridors that run south. Wherever possible it is essential to recognise that the sporting, educational, health and other interests are connected along these corridors. In the previous division of Logan I found it difficult to represent the different road corridors and indeed the services they used in other divisions to their north. I particularly wanted to comment on the draft boundaries that place areas north of Logan Village on the Waterford Tamborine corridor into Logan and the areas that are connected to Beaudesert-Beenleigh Rd that are suggested to be connected to Logan. Also, there is a proposal to place Buccan and the Cedar Creek are into Logan. there is not and never has been a community of interest with these areas and western Logan City. Rather with the former area, Buccan and Bahrs Scrub, the community of interest is to the North and the east, whilst Cedar Creek has a community of interest with the Coomera area. Equally, the draft suggestion that slashes the suburb of Regents Park into three different electorates undermines completely the task of community of interest. The Logan community is better served by having the suburbs of Browns Plains, Regents Park and Heritage Park within the one electorate -. the schools, the shopping centres, the sporting facilities, the public transport and the road corridors are all centred on the collection of suburbs. the draft submission in cutting across the Mount Lindesay Highway is an inferior way to treat people in the western suburbs of Logan City. Any proposal which unites these suburbs in my view adds to the community of interest. I would welcome the opportunity to appear before you in a public hearing to further outline these points. OVERVIEW

I am deeply concerned about the impact the Queensland Electoral Commission's re-mapping of boundaries will have on the people of the Mount Isa and the former Dalrymple electorates.

The bottom line is that the major parties have got what they wanted, while KAPs comprehensive proposal (Suggestion #277) in response to submissions from the LNP and Labor was ignored. We outlined how to realign seat boundaries with minimal impact to rural and regional Queensland. It's bitterly disappointing the ECQ has ignored that plan and greatly disadvantaged voters throughout the wider rural region by completely overhauling the seats.

With the proposed changes to the boundaries, there will be one less seat in western Queensland to represent the interests of people in the bush. This may not seem like a significant change however it is a continuation of a trend that is diminishing the voice of the people of rural Queensland.

My experience, both as an elected representative and as a constituent, has taught me that there are some key differences in the social and economic needs of people in the bush and people in the cities. To ensure these needs are fulfilled rural communities need more representation.

The State electorate of Mount Isa currently stretches from Mornington Island in the Gulf, south to Birdsville and east to Hughenden. There are 14 shires in total all of which I represent in Parliament.

With the proposed changes, the new electorate of Traegar will inherit Charters Towers Regional Council, in excess of about 12,000 people and lose the Diamantina and Winton Shire boundaries of less than 2,000 people combined.

This is a net gain of approximately 10,000 people who will need regular visits from their elected member. The proposed boundary change means the elected member will need to travel almost 800 kilometres between the two major population centres of Mount Isa and Charters Towers. It is unrealistic to expect that these people will be able to have the personal interaction they deserve under the new electoral boundaries.

It is ridiculous that the proposed re-mapping of boundaries will create new seats closer to metropolitan areas. This is another massive setback for rural communities, who are already struggling with representation in Parliament. These suggested changes will further diminish their voice and result in the continuation of a South-East centric government.

POTENTIAL CLOSURE OF OFFICES AND ADDITIONAL TRAVEL COSTS TO REPRESENT REGIONAL QUEENSLAND

Currently full time staffed electoral offices are situated in Mount Isa and Cloncurry for the seat of Mount Isa and Charters Towers and Atherton for the seat of Dalrymple. These offices are vital and form a strong link to the community through to their elected representative.

Under the redistribution, I would anticipate an additional (3rd office) would be provided to accommodate the changes to the electorate. Unless provided this will leave a huge void in the representation and connection to the local State member for the people of that region.

If adequate funding is not available to the elected representative of the proposed seat of Traegar it will be impossible to provide both major population centres of Mount Isa and Charters Towers with the representation they deserve.

This is a major backward step for rural representation as less service and less access to an elected official will result in a disconnection and inability because of distance to deliver vital Government services to the entire electorate.

The only practical way to service the electorate adequately is through air travel, however without additional travel funds allocated to the Trager electorate this will not be viable.

INCREASE OF ELECTORAL VOTERS IN REDICTRIBUTION

The redistribution is estimated to increase the number of voters in the Trager Electorate by 10,000. This is a disproportionate increase compared to other electorates and places an unfair burden on the State MP when coupled with the dispersion of people around the electorate.

To put it another way an example compared to the South Brisbane electorate is outlined below:

Trager = 36,090 people

South Brisbane = 30,582 people

Trager Electorate size = 490,048km²

South Brisbane Electorate size = 12km²

DISTANCE AND DIFFICULTTY IN TRAVEL – REMOTE REGIONAL ELECTORATES

The Mount Isa electorate takes in nearly one-third of Queensland's 1.7 million square kilometres. The idea of adding the large population center of Charters Towers, which is located almost 800 kilometres from the city of Mount Isa is outrageous. Beyond the main population centres there are many small communities who are equally entitled to representation.

In between the major population centres of Mount Isa and Charters Towers there are the whistlestops of Homestead, Pentland, Prairie and larger centres such as Hughenden, Richmond, Julia Creek and Cloncurry. The old drover's town of Camooweal, just 13km east of the Northern Territory border, is the electorate's most westerly populated community.

This entire region is interconnected with a network of secondary roads, some bitumen and some dirt, which facilitate the movement of cattle on road trains from the inland stations to marketing points on or near the coast.

In other parts it is a little travelled world of remote stations and national parks, some of which see only a handful of visitors a year. The electorate's major industries include tourism, beef, wool, mining and fishing.

I travel the electorate on a regular basis, visiting schools and community gatherings. The long drives could see me out of phone contact for "the best part of a day".

Flying can minimise the time I'm out of network and can travel long distances in a much shorter time. With my limited, government, air charter allowance you don't get far when it costs \$1,000 an hour in a twin engine plane (government regulations stipulate only twin engine for air charter).

At a personal cost at over \$30,000 I have nearly completed my pilots licence. This was done after realizing that the travel allowance was not commensurate with the resources required to do the job effectively in my electorate. I note the two other western MP's are also doing the same.

REDUCTION OF ELECTORATES & POLITICAL REPRESENTATION FOR REMOTE REGIONAL QUEENSLAND

The Member for Dalrymple, Shane Knuth, does an outstanding job of representing an electorate with diverse industry and geographic challenges. There should be more than just population taken into account when calculating geographical boundaries within the electoral redistribution.

The relocation of Charters Towers into Traegar will drastically weaken constituents' access to political representation, and Traegar constituents will now be among the least represented voters in Queensland. The changes are too extensive and will cause disruption and discontent amongst voters. It is outrageous to expect the Member for Traegar to provide the same level of representation as metropolitan people, with Charters Towers now included.

I believe the ECQ has made an oversight with this draft proposal and the electorate of Dalrymple should be reinstated. Traegar should be reduced in geographical size and additional seats added in Western Queensland to ensure that those who live in the north/Midwest are afforded a similar level of access to political representation as those living in the south east corner.

PETITIONS

Two petitions were launched – an independent one in Mount Isa and one in the Dalrymple electorate, both objecting to the redistribution of the States electoral boundaries. These petitions of the people of Queensland call on the ECQ Commissioner to reinstate the electorate of Dalrymple and reduce the super-sized electorate of Traegar (formally Mount Isa) to a more manageable size considering population distribution.

There is a strong feeling of animosity towards the redistribution proposal which has been highlighted in the comments secured on the petitions and online – some of which are outlined in community comments below.

COMMUNITY COMMENTS

“We really need Charters Towers and the old boundaries to be returned. As the current map is a joke”

“Putting it differently, how are people across such a large and diverse area expected to reach each other (and their Member of Parliament) and develop a truly representative voice?”

“Even if you don't live in these electorates, please consider supporting the farmers and the rural towns that are vital to our State by signing the petition. They are isolated enough, let's not also prevent them from reasonable access to their elected pollie.”

“In reality the South has been treating the State as two separate states for over 20years.

I see Bernard Salt waxing lyrical over the magnificence of the Sunshine Coast expansion and development for future years.

The South have become professional at promoting themselves at the expense of Regional Queensland. Maybe it is time for Regional Queensland to get some spine before we lose too many young families (our future) to the greedy South.

(It is like a snowball - the longer time rolls on the more the South becomes dominant - while the weaker the regions become. Whatever happens they always have an excuse to take so much of the cash and resources available to the whole state. There is no point having a sound reason for resources as the north is always outgunned).”

“Putting it another way, does this mean we should give the vote to blocks of land instead of people. :-)
However, an Upper House based on Members for regions would fix the problem of the vast majority of Queensland being unrepresented. So 3 Members for Brisbane, 3 for the Southern Metro Region (Gold Coast, Logan, Redlands and Scenic Rim), 3 for the Western Metro Region (Ipswich, Toowoomba etc.), 3 for the Northern Metro Region (Moreton Bay, Sunshine Coast, Noosa, Gympie), 3 for Central Queensland, 3 for North Queensland, 3 for Far North Queensland and 3 for Far West Queensland. So that's a 24 member Upper House, which will last until Queensland splits for a new state to cover the North.”

Traeger fails 'bbq test'

REGIONAL mayors have commented on an online petition demanding three MPs in the area of the proposed Traeger electorate.

Richmond mayor John Wharton said the electoral commission needed to consider royalties generated from the economies, and not just the population when adjusting the electorates.

Cr Wharton said he was strongly against the elector-

al commission's proposed change to merge Charters Towers in the seat of Daly with the Mount Isa electorate.

"Our local member has a massive electorate to cover and it is virtually impossible to do that well, or at all really," Cr Wharton said. He campaigned as the LNP candidate for the seat of Mount Isa in the 2015 state electorate.

"Let's think about having an electorate measured on

GDP instead of population. Then we will have many members."

Boulia mayor Rick Britton recently said that his shire would be better suited in the expanded Gregory electorate which absorbs Bedourie and Birdsville to the south. Cr Britton said on the petition that even three MPs were not enough for the proposed Traeger size. "I personally think there should be four."

Burke Shire mayor Ernie Camp said he agreed it was

time to adjust the electoral boundaries, but that population was not the appropriate gauge to adjust them. The same population did not mean constituents in all electorates were represented equally.

He used what he called the "barbecue test" as an example of disparity of representation. "How many functions enabling constituent engagement could an urban MP attend over the course of a weekend in comparison to

a rural (and) remote MP? The number would clearly show the inability of the latter to realistically engage once, let alone repeatedly, with his constituents despite having approximately the same number."

Cloncurry mayor Greg Campbell said he would submit to the commission that the proposed electorate was "a little bit smaller" but it would still be harder for the MP to give adequate representation.

CLONCURRY would be better off in an electorate with Charters Towers if Mount Isa was not part of it.

Managing director of stock and station agent Bradie & Co, Sam Daniels, is the face of an online petition which protests the proposed abolition of the Dairypeople electorate. This area which includes Charters Towers

would merge with the large Mount Isa seat, retreating the southern area including Ingham to the south, to become 'Traragon'.

"It would just be physically impossible for one person to be able to give us support we need because of the diverse areas in the region that have huge potential in agriculture and mining and just the ba-

in services," Mr Daniels said. "We've got a rail network that is completely outdated which needs work on it, the driest power in the world, and every road in the north west needs serious attention."

"With the community of mining and beef that goes out of this region and the amount of people it keeps in a job in the rest of the state it should be more seriously valued through more rep-

resentation in this area." He said that with more representation in parliament there was more chance for better service, roads, power prices, rail facilities and more jobs in the region.

"So we can build more mines, grow more cattle, truck these commodities out, and pay more royalties to the state, but unless we're given more representation it will never happen to its full

potential." The Queensland Redistricting Commission accepts objections for the proposed electorates until 5pm, Monday, March 27.

**Further Submission of Australian Labor Party (State of Queensland)
to the Queensland Redistribution Commission**

1. General Principles for Redistribution

The ALP's submission addresses the statutory factors for consideration set in section 46(1) of the *Electoral Act 1992*.

Given that significant consideration has already been undertaken, the ALP has focussed on improving communities of interest, particularly through:

- providing opportunities for suburbs to be contained entirely within one electorate; and
- Ensuring that transport routes are used to connect communities where possible.

The ALP submission also identifies opportunities to promote continuity of electorate boundaries in section 46(1)(d) by reverting to electorate boundaries in place since 2009 or before.

The ALP generally supports the use of geographical descriptors, indigenous or non-indigenous, in the name of State electorates. The ALP submits, in particular, that the proposed electorate of McConnel return to the previous name of Brisbane Central. The proposed change would leave Brisbane, as the State's capital, without a corresponding electorate.

2. ALP Suggestions to Support Community of Interest

2.1 Townsville Electorate: Palm Island

The ALP submits that the proposed boundaries be amended to include Palm Island in the Townsville electorate. This can be accommodated on existing enrolment numbers, leaving both Hinchinbrook and Townsville electorates within allowable enrolment levels.

The Palm Island community relies on a close alignment with a range of State government agencies and service providers on the island, that are operated from Townsville. These services include Health, Community and Child Safety, Queensland Police Service, Education, Housing and Public Works. Locating Palm Island in the same electorate as the relevant State government agencies improves the community of interest and supports advocacy for Palm Island residents by a Townsville based Member of Parliament.

Transport services to and from Palm Island include 12 daily return flights from Townsville to Palm Island, Sealink ferry service to the island operates 5 days per week from Townsville to Palm Island and return, and a new barge service from Townsville to Palm Island currently operates 3 days per week with the service expected to expand as demand grows. However, a supply barge operates from Lucinda, located in the electorate of Hinchinbrook, and delivers supplies to the island and removes waste. Should Palm Island remain within the Hinchinbrook electorate, the Member would be required to travel from Ingham to Townsville and connect with an air service to and from the island.

Family connections with many Palm Islander families are generally with Townsville residents. Many Palm Island residents move between Palm Island and Townsville for education and training, employment and health services. Many former Palm Island residents now reside in the Townsville electorate.

Palm Island Community Council has a strategic alignment with the Townsville City Council and works closely with mainland council to complement or enhance services on the island.

2.2 Logan City Electorates

Rochedale South in Springwood electorate

The proposed boundaries move a small portion of Rochedale South from Springwood electorate to the Waterford electorate.

The ALP submits that this small portion should remain in the Springwood electorate, ensuring that the whole of the suburb of Rochedale South is in the Springwood electorate, and maintaining the Pacific Motorway as the eastern boundary of the Waterford electorate.

Logan Electorate: Disparities in Enrolment And Community of Interest

The creation of Logan as an east-west electorate provides an electorate that is significantly below enrolment quotas in 2017, but significantly above enrolment quotas in 2023.

The ALP submits that the proposed electorates in the southern portion of Logan City area divide a number of communities of interest, rather than bringing communities together.

The proposed Logan electorate follows the border with the Scenic Rim Region and the new electorate of Scenic Rim. With the greatest of respect to the Commission, this misunderstands the north-south connections between communities of interest in Logan. Residents in this region travel north along State-controlled road corridors to access services, employment and shopping.

Communities of interest in this area are provided by combining growth communities with the road transport routes that connect these communities to established residential areas.


The communities of interest in southern Logan City are connected by:

- Connecting Browns Plains with communities to the south by the **Mount Lindesay Highway and Camp Cable Road** (Logan electorate); and
- Connecting all of Waterford and Buccan to Waterford by **Waterford Tamborine Road** (Waterford electorate)
- Connecting Woldene, Belivah, Cedar Creek and Karaibah to Windaroo by **Beenleigh-Beaudesert Road** (Coomera electorate)

- Connecting the eastern sections of Park Ridge to neighbouring Marsden and Crestmead by **Chambers Flat Road** (Woodridge electorate)

These key transport corridors are shown in Image 1. This is supported by the map Appendix 1 to this submission, the Department of Transport and Main Roads South Coast Region map of State-controlled road networks.

.Image 1: Logan City transport corridors



The ALP proposes the changes to reflect these transport routes as connectors of community of interest.

- Reverting to previous boundaries in the west of Logan City by returning:
 - Boronia Heights to Algester electorate
 - Browns Plains, Regents Park and Heritage Park west of Bayliss Road to Logan electorate.

This reinstates the connection between the shopping and service precincts at Browns Plains, and the growing communities to its south that access these services by the Mount Lindesay Highway.

- Bringing divided suburbs together by:
 - Combining Loganholme in to Macalister electorate
 - Combining Bethania and Waterford in to the Waterford electorate
 - Combining Logan Reserve into the Waterford electorate
- Along **Chambers Flat Road**, add that part of Park Ridge that uses Chambers Flat Road to neighbouring Crestmead and Marsden and the Woodridge electorate
- Along **Waterford-Tamborine Road**, adding Buccan to Waterford electorate
- Along **Beenleigh-Beaudesert Road**, adding Woldene, Belivah, Cedar Creek and Kairabah to Windaroo and Bannockburn by the Beenleigh-Beaudesert Road.

These changes would better reflect the role of State-controlled roads as transport as connectors of community in southern Logan.

These changes would leave all Logan City electorates with enrolments within allowable quotas, and ensure that the significant over-enrolment in the Logan electorate in 2023 is significantly reduced.

Image 2: ALP Proposed Waterford Electorate





Image 3: ALP Proposed Logan Electorate



2.3 Moreton Bay Electorates: D’Aguilar, Kurwongbah & Morayfield

The Queensland Redistribution Commission’s proposal at page 159, regarding the Moreton Bay region specifically notes its intention “to be inclusive of shared community interests, holding areas with close connectivity together in a district”.

Notwithstanding this, the proposal for the region results in a number of distinct suburbs being divided. The division of suburbs including but not limited to Bray Park,

Burpengary, Upper Caboolture and Lawnton, results in an unnecessary divide of communities, bound by suburb, being represented by different electorates.

This outcome not only acts to divide strong communities of interest but is oft confusing for electors.

In addition to this, the electorate of D'Aguilar at its north boundary includes the suburbs of Mount Pleasant and King Scrub. Both these areas hold a much stronger community of interest with the suburbs at the southern border of Tibrogargan due to their rural nature and shared amenities.

Accordingly, the ALP submits that the QRC should address the above issues by:

- Moving the entirety of the suburb of Burpengary into the Kurwongbah electorate;
- Moving the entirety of the suburbs of Joyner and Bray Park in the D'Aguilar electorate;
- Moving the suburb of Lawnton to be wholly encompassed in the Kurwongbah electorate;
- Moving Mount Pleasant and King Scrub to the Tibrogargan electorate; and
- Moving the remainder of Upper Caboolture into Tibrogargan.

The ALP's proposal for this region results in all the affected electorates remaining within population requirements whilst simultaneously holding areas of close connectivity, based on suburb, together.

Image 4: ALP Proposed Morayfield Electorate





Image 5: ALP Proposed D'Aguilar Electorate



2.4 Maiwar Electorate

We submit that the suburb of Fig Tree Pocket should be located entirely within the the electorate of Moggill given the strong community ties forged over decades with the surrounding suburbs of Kenmore and Chapel Hill.

To help offset this proposed change, we submit that the section of the suburb of Indooroopilly located on the western side of the Western Freeway be placed in the electorate of Maiwar, consistent with the former Indooroopilly electorate.


Granted, this small section of Indooroopilly is separated from the rest of the suburb of Indooroopilly by the Western Freeway. This has proven not to affect the far greater affinity shared with fellow Indooroopilly residents as opposed to residents of Chapel Hill and Kenmore. The main access points to this section of Indooroopilly are from Russell Terrace and Waverley Road crossing the Western Freeway, rather than any access to Moggill Road.

Specifically, this would ensure that both the electorates of Moggill and Maiwar are of appropriate size, with Moggill at approximately 36,400 and Maiwar 34,000.

2.5 Gold Coast electorates

Joining logical communities of interest, based on practical boundaries in actual local communities is imperative to the creation of logical electoral boundaries that best represent shared community interests.

The theme park district on the Gold Coast including Movie World, Australian Outback Spectacular and Wet 'n' Wild acts to divide the suburb of Oxenford with a clear

boundary. The significant size and placement of the theme park district results in a divide of the community of interest and access between southern Oxenford and the remainder of the suburb. As a consequence, southern Oxenford shares a stronger community of interest with Pacific Pines.

Similarly, Emerald Lakes is a community with Emerald Lakes Golf Course as its focal point. The Emerald Lakes area is closely connected to Benowa, of which one of the major focal points is the Royal Pines Resort Golf Course, as shared golf centred areas connected easily by Birmingham Road. These communities should accordingly be represented by the same electorate.

In the same vein, the ALP submits that more of the suburb of Southport should be grouped together in the electorate of Bonney. This would draw together many of the students attending the Bonney based Southport State High School into the electorate in which their school is based. Thus, drawing together a more logical community of interest boundary, based around the school, at Bonney's southern border.

Accordingly, the ALP submits that the QRC should address the above issues by:

- Moving the northern boundary of Gaven to be the border of the Wet 'n' Wild theme park extending through Kopps Road to Saltwater Creek, thus encompassing southern Oxenford in the electorate of Gaven;
- Moving Emerald Lakes at the South boundary of Gaven into Southport;
- Moving a larger portion of Southport suburb into Bonney so that its Southern border to the East is bounded by Wardoo, Queen and Nerang Streets.

The ALP's proposal for this region results in all the affected electorates remaining within population requirements whilst simultaneously joining areas of community interest, based on local landmarks and amenities, together.

Image 7: ALP Proposed Southport Electorate




Image 8: ALP Proposed Theodore Electorate





Image 9: ALP Proposed Coomera Electorate



2.6 Rockhampton electorates: Rockhampton & Keppel

The ALP submits that the suburbs of Koongal and Lakes Creek should not transfer to Rockhampton but should remain in the Keppel electorate.


These suburbs are currently in the Keppel electorate and are closely connected to neighbouring Frenchville. Lakes Creek also contains Emu Park Road, the key transport route between Rockhampton's northern suburbs and the Keppel coast.

This change would leave both Keppel and Rockhampton electorates within the allowable enrolment quotas.

2.7 Toowoomba North electorate

The ALP submits that the QRC should transfer the following SA1s from Toowoomba South electorate to the Toowoomba North electorate: 3145312, 3145313, 3145314 and 3145315. This would see the remainder of SA1s in the Newtown (Qld) SA2* with their community of interest in the Toowoomba North electorate.


Correcting this division of the community of Newtown should be given priority by the Commission given many residents in this area send their children to the Newtown State School and Wilsonton State High School both in the electorate of Toowoomba North and conduct much of their business in Toowoomba North at the Clifford Gardens Shopping Centre.

Additionally, the proposed amendment would rationalise the south-western border of the electorate. The current border arbitrarily follows the curved Tor Street, and the proposed amendment would provide for a more logical straight line that encompasses the Newtown suburb, and would better reflect the north/south methodology employed for the two Toowoomba City electorates.

2.8 Lytton electorate

The ALP submits that this reversion would support a strong community of interest in the Tingalpa community.


This area contains Tingalpa Primary School, which is the hub of the suburb of Tingalpa. Placing the school within the Lytton electorate separates it from the rest of the suburb from which its catchment is taken, including the businesses along the other side of Wynnum Road, and the community organisations which actively support it.

This area also contains the Moreton Bay Sports Club. Placing this club within the Lytton electorate separates it from Belmont and the remainder of Tingalpa, from where a significant portion of its membership comes. This includes Kianawah Park on the southern side of Wynnum Road, where its large cricket club undertakes all its training and matches.

2.9 Nudgee & Clayfield electorates



2.10 Gladstone & Callide electorates

The ALP submits that the newly developed area of Calliope between the Bruce Highway and Racecourse Road should be transferred to the Gladstone electorate from the Callide electorate.


This would then allow rural communities of Mount Larcom, Ambrose, Raglan and Mount Alma to be transferred to the Callide electorate.

Magpies Sporting Club has currently the only large community club located in the Whitsunday electorate, and its removal will see none left. We have worked hard to have a good, sound relationship with our local member, and believe removing a population such as Glenella from the Whitsunday electorate will be of some disadvantage, particularly as substantial funding would be competed against 2 other major clubs.

I am writing regarding the current boundary review process. Gympie Regional Council takes in much of the Mary Valley, west to Goomeri, north past Gunalda and east to the Cooloola Coast including Rainbow Beach and Tin Can Bay. The current council boundaries reflect communities of interest both socially and economically. Council, with concern, has noted the proposed boundary amendments which place Rainbow Beach in the Noosa Electorate instead of Gympie.

Rainbow Beach has a strong affinity with Gympie and the Gympie region. With Gympie being the closest significant population base to Rainbow Beach, there are inevitable strong economic and community links in terms of the Rainbow Beach community drawing on the health, education, retail, and commercial services which Gympie provides.

To emphasise the point, travel time from Rainbow Beach to Noosa is approximately 1 hour and 40 minutes as opposed to 50 minutes to Gympie.

Rainbow Beach is very much its own entity, can certainly not be seen as part of the growing Sunshine Coast hinterland and has significant constraints in terms of its future growth given the amount of state government controlled land surrounding it.

Whilst the task of the commission is a difficult one in terms of ensuring an even distribution of electors across the new electoral districts, the number of electors in Rainbow Beach is very small. Given this council believes that a practical solution could be found which would place Rainbow Beach back in the Gympie electorate and more importantly place the Rainbow Beach community in an electorate with which it shares communities of interest and very strong associations.

I am writing a submission of formal complaint about the boundary changes for the Gympie region, specifically the annexation of Rainbow Beach from the Gympie electorate. Firstly I should note, I have been a resident of Rainbow Beach for 9 years, but have also lived here at various stages through my life. I currently live here with my wife and two children, a third due in August. My brother and father also live in town and we have roots running all the way back to Gordon Elmer, the first official "resident" of Rainbow Beach, buying the first block available in 1971. Rainbow is my home. I don't agree with the boundary changes for several reasons but the main point is lack of consultation. The first I had heard of the change was through a mutual friend a few days before our local town meeting about the decision. These processes are purposefully obfuscated from "Joe Public" but "interested parties" are well aware of these processes and have an upper hand in negotiations. A bad start to proceedings was the absence of anyone from Noosa council even bothering to show up to the meeting. We had 3 representatives from the Gympie area's local and state level government, all of which spent additional time after the meeting to discuss locals concerns. Noosa wants the prize of Rainbow but doesn't think it's worth the time to come meet with us? Not a good way to start! Not many residents in Rainbow Beach would have been looking at a announcement buried in the back of a paper somewhere, in June 2016, and even had consideration that we would be attached to Noosa in 12 months time. However the people who would seek to exploit these rules to take advantage of our communities resources, have surely been involved in the background from day one, making their submissions back in July 16. People who are in regular contact with the halls of power in government and have been selling their agenda, long before Rainbow residents were even aware that a change may be possible. "Just because you're paranoid doesn't mean they aren't after you." — Joseph Heller, Catch-22 Rainbow Beaches only commonality with Noosa is we both have a Beach and both think we are the real owners of Double Island Point! Thats about it! The people, mindset, social structure, economics as well as community roots are just not there. We have a genuine affinity with our local communities at Tin Can Bay and Cooloola Cove, we are the Cooloola Coast and until council amalgamations years ago, we were always considered part of the same community, with different townships. Noosa has never even registered for me, as being related to Rainbow Beach in any way, except mutually through the National park, but even then Teewah is quite different to Rainbow. The Gympie region and the Cooloola coast have been tied together all the way back to the original electorate of Nash, which became Gympie electorate in 1959. Local council and state government services, rates, waste management, fire and ambulance services are all handled through the prism of Gympie's core services. Why shift our towns electorate from the area that actually provides the resources and services? Seems convoluted and unnecessary. Most access to medical facilities, shopping, high schools, public transport, government services, including licensing and family services are all local to Gympie. An approximate 1.5 hour RETURN drive to Gympie, is far eclipsed by the equivalent, ONE WAY trip to Noosa. That also

fails to mention the half hour to find a car park in Noosa, on a good day, or the \$12-\$20 for paid parking and additional cost of fuel. My family and I would be lucky to go to Noosa twice a year but we would probably go to Gympie twice a month, minimum. As far as access to facilities, services, transport and GOVERNMENT, Gympie wins hands down every time. The only access to Noosa is via back roads, logging roads, the beach or the highway. All the scenic drives are certainly beautiful when you have the time but are anything far from convenient or even reliably open. A good 40% of our continually returning guests are from the Gympie and surrounding regional areas, they are the lifeblood of the town during the quiet season. Gympie has a vested and expressed interest in the well being of Rainbow Beach, they may not always deliver 100% but they at least try to consider our position and we always seem to get quite a lot of bang for our buck. It feels like Gympie see's us as an asset to invest in, it feels like Noosa just wants control of Double Island Point and access to a "stepping stone to Fraser Island" marketing campaign. I may very well be wrong but as my main point iterates, no consultation or information leads people, myself included, to draw their own conclusions. The upsides for Noosa are quite obvious, the upsides for Rainbow are yet to be offered. Rainbow has some level of political leverage within local and state government because we are "the jewel in the crown" of the Cooloola/Fraser coast, but also because we are united with Tin Can and Cooloola Coves interest, together we have more strength than if we are broken up and split away from our community, which seems to be a covert motivation for this move. Divide and conquer may work most of the time but in our day and age, moves like this breed lack of faith in government, which is already at historically high levels. If this proposal was made to include Tin Can Bay, Cooloola Cove and Rainbow Beach, I think you would be looking at a very different response and a much more open and responsive citizenry. Slicing us away from our closet neighbours however, leaves us feeling threatened and vulnerable to the weight of Noosa electorates 35k+ voter vs Rainbows 560 odd, I wonder who will win that fight? Noosa fought the government to de-amalgamate their council a few years back, they felt picked on by the big boys and didn't like it, they should know better than most what this situation feels like. The proposed electorate would have 35,467 electors, 6.93% above quota and is predicted to have 38543 electors by 2023, 4.57% above quota. Rainbow Beaches electors are only approx 560, less than 2% of the quota total. This proposal seems quite drastic, extending Noosa's sphere of influence from the edge of Lake Cootharaba, to sweep all the way through the Great Sandy National park right up to the front door of Fraser Island. Its only 560 people, what the big deal you may say? It's 560 people yes but it's also includes a few hundred square kilometres of pristine beauty and natural resources, to think it's not a coveted asset is just silly. I think it all boils down to influence, power and community. Under this proposal Rainbow Beach would lose out on all counts. If Noosa wants to come back with a clear sales pitch and the inclusion of Tin Can and Cooloola then i'm sure myself and others would be glad to hear it out, at this point it seems like a power grab by those in power at Noosa. It feels like this will just lead to condominiums dotted all the way down to Inskip Point, Which I don't think anyone except the property developers want. Consultation and communication leads to better and more stable outcomes for residents, business and government. Please don't rush this decision. Thanks for your time and consideration. Cloncurry Shire Council Submission to State Electoral Boundary Changes

The Secretary,

The Cloncurry Shire Council objects to the proposed changes to the electoral boundary of the Mount Isa/Traeger electorate.

The basis of the proposed change reflects the policy direction that electorate size is relative to population. There is also the geographic allowance of 2% for large areas over 100,000km².

This submission is in no way linked to the support of any political party or individual, it is based on having adequate representation at State level for a critical part of the State.

The council objection is based on two primary points –

1. The physically impossible task of adequately representing an area approximately 500,000km². This is also the case currently and the addition of Charters Towers (currently in Dalrymple) only exacerbates the task.
2. The notion of equitable representation based on population, when numerous other factors exist to determine electoral boundaries.
3. It should be noted upfront, that the three biggest electorates are currently too big and making them bigger either by area or population is only making an unacceptable situation worse.

The proposed Traeger electorate will be approximately 1,000km long and averages 500km wide with an equivalent population close to 30,000 people.

Now take the generally expected attendance at functions, be it School, Council or community, across two regional cities, a major regional town and numerous smaller towns and communities, somebody is going to miss out. The people of Traeger getting second rate representation already, regardless of the effort the MP puts in.

The smallest electorate is 12km² (4km wide by 3 km long) possible to walk around it by lunchtime!

4. The boundary review was centred on even population distribution. This leaves us with the situation we have to deal with, where an electorate:
 - 12km² is equal to an electorate 500,000km².
 - 12km² electorate delivers \$0 in royalties versus one that delivers approximately \$310 Million in royalties.

- 12km² electorate covers a couple of suburbs versus an electorate that covers a vastly diverse range of cities, towns and communities.
- 12km² electorate has extremely easy access to government agencies and support versus an electorate where the government services are continually being downgraded and centralised.
- Traeger electorate supports thousands of jobs based out of Brisbane, Townsville and Cairns, and tens of thousands more through ports, mineral processing, beef processing and service industries.
- With reference to the ongoing reduction in state government services, the State MP and his/her staff are becoming increasingly responsible as a point of contact to deal with the issues that arise from no services 'on the ground'.
- The issues that arise from neighbouring state electorates in metropolitan areas, that cover a handful of suburbs are extremely similar and could easily be represented by less MPs (who will still be only a few kilometres away) as opposed to the Traeger area, where the issues are extremely diverse, from Aboriginal communities, to major mining, potential agriculture and serious transport issues.
- The ratio of MPs in comparison to Local Government representation is another indicator worth review. Brisbane City Council is represented by the Lord Mayor, yet the Brisbane City area is represented by a score of State MPs. Traeger will have one MP representing an area of 13 Councils.
- The 'population factor' does not seem to have any basis of credibility; it just seems to be a figure 'plucked' out of the air to support a pre-determined result. Make the factor proportional to the area ie the greater the physical area the greater the factor, allowing large electorates to not have to become the massive unworkable size they have become.

To conclude, the mining and agricultural areas of rural and regional Queensland are crucial to the prosperity and survival of this great State, but without adequate representation the area will fall behind and fail to continue to deliver positive economic benefit for the people of Queensland.

The State cannot continue to reduce the services to these areas and at the same time reduce our ability to demand comparative access, to that of metropolitan areas.


