he new Councils began to work in harmony for the good of the whole of CQ. All that has now come unstuck and our communities are once again divided, neighbour against neighbour, father against son. These boundary wars simply must stop!

The Northern Suburbs of LSC have been part of that Shire since 1903 and they should remain that way. The Treasury report itself states that the economic benefits to RRC will be marginal but there will be a detrimental effect for LSC. Clearly this land grab by RRC is intended to open up the northern suburbs to high density urban sprawl in years to come. RRC is not short of land to develop. There is ample opportunity to increase the density of housing within the city itself, by both battle axing blocks and fully utilising vacant land. \$40.4 Million dollars has recently been allocated towards piping water to just 2000 residents in Mt Morgan. That sort of expenditure cannot be justified on such a small population living just 30 mins commute to Rockhampton. Surely the future growth area for RCC should now be along that pipeline? There is no valid justification for the boundary realignment.
