Queenslanders will head to the polls on 26 October 2024 to **vote on what counts** – and have a say about things that matter to them.

Around 3.7 million Queenslanders will be eligible to vote in the elections and will choose the members of Parliament who will represent them for the next four years.

While voting is compulsory, it's also a right and responsibility in our democracy, and we want to ensure voting is quick and easy for everyone.

# Now's the time to *vote on what counts to* you! — 26 October 2024

When Queenslanders **vote on what counts** at the 2024 State election, they'll be voting for the decision-makers who will shape their community.

Voting in a State election is about more than just health, education, and housing. It's about choosing a Member of Parliament that you want to represent you and your community.

Now's the time to make sure you're ready to vote on 26 October 2024 and ensure your voice will be heard.

Remember, voting is compulsory.

# Vote anywhere in Queensland

You don't need to vote in your local area. You can vote at any early voting centre or election day polling place in Queensland.

## Vote when it's convenient for you

Because accessibility is a key priority for the ECQ, there are options for people who may find it difficult to attend a polling place – or who just don't want to.



- Postal voting —request a postal vote on the ECQ website at <a href="ecq.qld.gov.au/postalvoting">ecq.qld.gov.au/postalvoting</a> or phone 1300 881 665. Postal votes do not have to be sent to your address on the electoral roll. If you'll be away from your residence during the election, we can send the postal vote directly to you. If you are already registered as a special postal voter, we will send you your voting information automatically.
- **Telephone voting** available for eligible voters including people who cannot physically visit a polling place. Check to see if you're eligible by reading our <u>Telephone voting fact sheet</u>.
- **Declared institution** voting in an aged care facility may be an option for residents if the aged care facility has been approved as a declared institution. For more information, visit the Declared institution fact sheet.

If you prefer to vote in person, you can check the accessibility of an early voting or election day voting centre using the <u>Find My Polling Booth page</u> on the ECQ's website. Early voting centres will be open from 8am to 6pm on weekdays from Monday 14 October to Friday 25 October 2024. On Saturday 26 October, voting centres will also be open from 8am to 6pm.

Each voting location also has support services available:

- Request another person (an election official or anyone else) to join you if you need help voting to act as an interpreter, read and explain the ballot paper instructions, complete the ballot paper according to your instructions and place the ballot paper in the ballot box.
- If you are unable to access a polling place or leave your vehicle an election official can bring your ballot papers to your vehicle so you can vote and place your vote in a ballot box without leaving the vehicle. A sign will be posted outside the polling place with the number to call.
- Bring your Voter Information Card all Queenslanders on the electoral roll (except special postal voters) will receive a Voter Information Card in the mail before the elections. That's the big maroon card that you may recall receiving before at previous state and local government elections. Bringing this card with you when you come to vote will help you to get in and out of the polling booth quicker. If your email address is on the electoral roll, you will also receive a Voter Information Card through email.

## Travelling during the voting period

If you are travelling in October, you will want to make a plan to vote around your travels. For those travelling in Queensland, you can vote at any polling place in Queensland. Whether you're in Bundaberg, Warwick or anywhere else in Queensland, you can visit a local polling place. The <u>Find My Polling Booth page</u> on the ECQ's website will help find a convenient location.

You can also request a postal vote be sent to where you are staying during your travels. You can request a postal vote on the ECQ website at <a href="ecq.qld.gov.au/postalvoting">ecq.qld.gov.au/postalvoting</a> or phone 1300 881 665 and specify the correct mailing address.

If you will be travelling interstate or overseas, you are always able to vote before or after your travels, but if that won't work, you can also <u>request a postal vote</u> or check your eligibility to vote by telephone using the ECQ's <u>Telephone voting fact sheet</u>.

# **Election Facts. STOP and CONSIDER**

Lots of information flies around during elections. The ECQ encourages everyone to stop and consider if information is factual before they share it online or in person.

Ask yourself a few questions. Does it come from a reputable source? Is it current? Could it be a scam?



# Frequently asked questions

## Is voting compulsory?

Voting is compulsory for all Australian citizens aged 18 years or older. If you do not vote, you may receive a fine. It will be compulsory for all enrolled Queenslanders to vote for the Member of Parliament they want to represent them for the next four years.

#### Are you enrolled to vote?

Visit <u>aec.gov.au</u> to enrol to vote or to check your details are up-to-date.

#### Have you changed address?

If you've changed address since the last election, you'll need to update your details on the electoral roll to ensure you are voting in the correct electorate. Update your details at <a href="mailto:aec.gov.au">aec.gov.au</a>.

#### Why do I need to vote in a State general election?

Voting for your Member of Parliament helps determine the future of Queensland. The Queensland government is responsible for education, health, the environment, transport, sport and recreation, public works, police services and more.

Every time you go to a hospital or visit a public school, your State government is at work. Don't miss out on having a say on how it works for you.

# Why is voting important?

Governments make decisions about services, laws and protections that impact on every part of our lives. By voting, you are part of this decision-making and making a choice about how Queensland is run.

If you don't vote, you are relying on someone else to choose your representative for you. The best way to make sure you are involved in decisions about your community is to vote.

#### What is a Voter Information Card?

A Voter Information Card is sent to your enrolled address before an election in Queensland. An email version is also sent to you if you have added your email address to the electoral roll.

Your card is personalised for you and includes your electorate and a barcode that election staff can scan at a polling place to help you get in and out quicker.

# How can I cast my vote?

Every Queenslander can choose the most convenient way for them to vote.

- Vote on election day, 26 October 2024 you can vote at any polling place in Queensland.
  The <u>Find My Polling Booth tool</u> on the ECQ website will help you find the best polling place for you. Bring your maroon Voter Information Card with you for quicker voting. You can vote from 8am to 6pm on election day.
- Vote early from 14 October 2024 you can vote before election day at an early voting centre anywhere in Queensland. Bring your maroon Voter Information Card with you for quicker voting. Early voting centres are open from 8am–6pm Monday-Friday from 14–25 October 2024. Visit the <a href="ECQ website">ECQ website</a> to find an early voting centre.

- Vote by post anyone can request a postal vote. The most direct way to apply is via the
   <u>ECQ website</u> before requests close at 7pm on Monday 14 October 2024. When you receive
   your voting materials, you can complete your vote straight away but remember to read the
   instructions carefully to ensure your vote can be included in the count. Return your postal
   vote as soon as you can. The ECQ must receive it by 5pm on Tuesday 5 November 2024.
   Visit the ECQ website to watch a short video about postal voting.
- Voting by telephone telephone voting is available for eligible electors who cannot attend
  a polling place because they are away or cannot vote without assistance. Check the <u>ECQ's</u>
  <u>fact sheet</u> to see if you are eligible before registering. Registration for eligible people is
  from 9am on Monday 14 October until noon on Saturday 26 October 2024. You can vote
  from 14 October until 6pm on election day, 26 October 2024.

#### How do I know which electorate I am enrolled in?

Your electorate is on your Voter Information Card or you can find it on the <u>ECQ website</u>. During a State general election, you can vote at any polling place in Queensland.

# Is there help for people with accessibility needs?

Check the <u>Find My Polling Booth webpage</u> for the accessibility access at polling places in your local area. If you have mobility issues you can also vote from your car. Call the phone number of the supervisor, which can be found on a sign out the front of the voting centre, and an election official will come out to your car to help.

#### I need help filling out my ballot paper.

If you need help when voting, another person can assist you in the polling place. This person may act as an interpreter, read, and explain the ballot paper instructions, complete the ballot paper according to your instructions and place the ballot paper in the ballot box. You may bring a friend or relative to assist you or ask an election official to help.

#### Is there help for people who do not speak English or have limited English?

Every polling place in Queensland will have voting information in 25 languages. Ask a staff member for the <u>Multilingual Guide</u> when you arrive to vote. If the language you need is not available in the Guide, a telephone translation and interpreting service is available through Language Loop. Election staff can assist you with these contact details.

#### I need voting information written more simply.

The ECQ has developed an Easy read guide to voting in a State election. The information in this guide is written in an easier to read way. Pictures are also used to explain concepts. The Guide is available as an <u>accessible PDF</u> or as a webpage in <u>accessible HTML</u>.

#### I heard something about the election that doesn't sound right.

The ECQ is Queensland's team of electoral experts, so if you hear or see something you're not sure about, visiting our <u>Election Facts webpage</u> will help ensure you have the facts about elections.

Stop and consider the information is reputable, current or a scam before sharing information about the electoral process online.
